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I. HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

The highlights for the Institute during the academic year 1977-78 have been a) organizational review exercise, b) change in the steward-ship, and c) continued growth and fine-tuning of various activities.

At the beginning of the year, Director Samuel Paul appointed a faculty committee, which came to be known as the Committee for Future Directions, to review the Institute's academic activities for the past five years or so, assess the organizational strengths and weaknesses, and recommend directions in which the Institute should move in the next five to ten years. The Committee submitted its report in September 1977. The report is now being discussed by the faculty.

Coinciding with the organizational review exercise, Professor
Paul decided to step down from the directorship after a six—year
term. Professor Paul's decision was in the Institute's traditions
laid down by his predecessor Professor Ravi J. Matthai. Both
Professors Matthai and Paul believed that a change in leadership
after some years would be good for the Institute. We all recognise
the fine contribution made by Professor Paul in the growth of the
Institute.

During the year under review, the Institute took a major step in the direction of institution building activity. At the request of the Government of India, the Institute agreed to assist in the establishment of a national Institute of Forestry Management. The

Institute also agreed to organize management development programmes for three years for the officials concerned with handloom development.

In addition, the Institute entered into collaboration agreements with the management institutions in Egypt and Tanzania.

In the Post-Graduate Programme in Management, our efforts to admit as many Scheduled Castes/Tribes students as possible continued. In addition, there has been an effort to remodel the Preparatory Programme to make it more effective. Further discussions have been going on for evolving an extended programme for the benefit of the people from weaker sections of the society. In the light of these efforts, the appreciation of the Institute's remedial programme expressed by the Parliamentary Committee on the Welfare of Schedule Castes/Tribes has been a welcome booster for the Institute.

The Fellow title awarded for the completion of the Fellow Programme in Management was recognized this year by the Government of India as equivalent to a Ph.D. degree for recruitment to superior posts and services in the government. Earlier, the Association of Indian Universities had recognized the Fellow Programme as equivalent to a doctoral programme.

In the Management Development Programmes, our effort continued to be to strengthen quality of training, introduce new programmes on socially relevant themes and to integrate research and training activities. Out of 22 management development programmes offered this year, six programmes were new.

During the year, apart from the research projects in the Public Systems Group and the Centre for Management in Agriculture, we had 27 research projects on hand. Two projects were completed, and nine new ones were added. The faculty and staff also published 18 books, 16 monographs, and 96 articles, and presented 35 papers in research seminars and conferences.

In keeping with the growth and efficiency of the academic activities, physical facilities and other support facilities had also
to be strengthened. During the year, the Institute decided to
expand the computer facilities and supplement the existing HewlettPackard Time Sharing System to meet the growing demand from teaching
and research programmes. The new system is expected to be installed
by the middle of 1978. In addition, a 30-room dormitory was
completed, the students' section of the kitchen-dining complex was
made ready, and work was started on building more housing facilities
for staff on the campus.

Locking back at the year that we have just completed, it is obvious that the Institute could not have achieved what it had with—out the active support of its sponsors — the Government of India, the Government of Gujarat, and the Industry. At the Institute, active participation of the faculty, staff, and students made the year another landmark in the Institute's history.

Second Annual Conference

The Second Annual Conference of the Society on "New Horizons in Management" was held on February 3 and 4, 1978. From 37 organizations, 61 members attended the conference.

Professors Labdhi R. Bhandari, Mohan Kaul, and Pradip N. Khand-walls presented papers on "Emerging Issues in the Role of Distribution Sector," "Some Likely Trends in the Use of Computers in Management," and "Management in Our Backyard" respectively. These topics represent some of the important areas in which research is currently in progress at the Institute. A panel discussion on "Research on Rural Development" was also held on the second day of the conference. Professor V.S. Vyas

chaired and moderated the panel discussion. The members of the panel were Professors B.M. Desai, Ranjit Gupta, T.K. Moulik, and T.V. Rao.

Shri Kasturbhei Lalbhei inaugurated the conference. Professor Bhandari was the convenor of the conference.

PERSONNEL.

Professor V.S. Vyas Takes Over as Director

Professor Samuel Paul, following the example set by his predecessor, Professor Ravi J. Matthai, requested the Board to relieve him from Directorship, after continuing in this office for six years. Both of them believed that a voluntary change in leadership after some years would be good for the Institute.

The Board selected Professor V.S. Vyas to succeed Professor Paul, and he took over charge from July 1, 1978.

Newcomers

Dr K.V. Ramani joined the Production and Quantitative Methods Area, on October 12, 1977, as Assistant Professor. He received his Ph.D. in Operations Research from the Cornell University, Ithaca, New York. Dr. Ramani was a Senior Research Analyst, Operations Research Group, Baroda.

Dr Tirath R. Gupta joined the Centre for Management in Agriculture on October 19, 1977, as Associate Professor. He has a Ph.D. from the University of Massachusetts, USA. Earlier, Dr. Gupta was Associate Professor of Agricultural Economics, Punjäb Agricultural University, Ludhiana.

III. POST-GRADUATE PROGRAMME IN MANAGEMENT

Fourteenth Session

The Fourteenth Session of the Post—Graduate Programme began on June 27, 1977, with 166 students (including 26 students for agricultural specialisation) in the first year and 152 (including 28 students for agricultural specialisation) in the second year. Six first year students discontinued their studies during the year. The first year class had 15 students from Scheduled Castes/Tribes and one student from USA. Curriculum Changes

The compulsory package of courses in the programme has been increa—

sing year by year with the result that the students had decreasing number of electives to choose in the second year. The PGP Committee recommended a review of the package of compulsory courses to provide a viable package of elective courses in the second year. After the review, it was decided that only Business Policy-I & II be offered as compulsory courses in the second year and the relevant topics from the remaining compulsory courses of the second year form part of the first year courses.

However, in the light of the recommendations of the First Year Integration Committee, the second year students will study four computer scry courses during the academic year 1978—79 Business Policy—I & II, Computer and Data Processing Systems, and Indian Social and Political Environment. The latter two courses will be shifted to the first year in 1979—80.

On the recommendations of the first Year Integration Committee, a new course on "Legal Aspects of Business" was added in the first year. This course and another new course on "Indian Social and Political Environment" were offered in the second year for the benefit of the graduating class which did not have these courses in the first year.

Another committee was appointed to examine suggestions for improving the conduct of the Fourth Term. Based on the recommendations of this committee, the second year students will be permitted to credit six, five, and four courses in the first, second, and third terms respectively from the academic year 1978-79 as against present scheme of five courses. in each term in the second year.

Non-Credit Activities

From March 1 to 31, 1978, a series of Non-Credit Courses/Lectures were organized for the graduating students. The Non-Credit Activities included courses on Managerial Oral Communication, Computer Programming, Film on Management, Case Writing, etc.

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Institute Lecture Series

The "Institute Lecture Series" was instituted to provide a forum to the students, staff, and faculty as well as practising managers in Ahmedabad to hear the views of distinguished persons on various problems related to management, national policies, and other wider social issues. The first lecture was delivered by Mr S. Shoothalingam, Chairman, Study Group on Wages, Incomes & Prices, Government of India, New Delhi, on

February 22, 1978, on "Some Aspects of the Management of the Economy."

Mrs Mrinal Gore, M.P., talked on "Consumer Protection" on March 16.

Mr B.G. Verghese, Journalist, spoke on "The Role of Media in a Free

Society: Freedom with Responsibility" on March 21.

Students' Exchange Visit

Thirty—four students from IIM, Calcutta, and 30 students from IIM, Bangalore, visited the Institute from November 19 to 23, 1977, to return the goodwill visit paid by the IIMA students during the previous academic year. The students participated in social, cultural, academic, and sports activities.

13th Annual Convocation

At the convocation on April 1, 1978, 152 students of the 1976-78 class (including 28 students with specialization in Agricultural Management) were awarded the Institute's Post-Graduate Diploma in Management. Shri H.M. Patel, Finance Minister, Government of India, delivered the convocation address.

Financial Aid

Loan assistance of Rs. 3,17,300 was given to 122 students. State Bank of India provided Rs. 2,00,400 and the Bank of Baroda Rs. 54,900. The rest of the amount was contributed by the Institute.

Industry Scholarships

Seven first year students and seven second year students were awarded the industry scholarships of Rs. 3,000 each.

8.K. Hegde and Warren Haynes Memorial Scholarships

Mr Arun Shroff, 2nd year student was awarded the BK Hegde Memorial PGP scholarship of Rs. 1,500. Mr D. Sethi, 1st year student was awarded the Warren Haynes Memorial PGP Scholarship.

Government of India Merit-cum-Means Scholarships

Nineteen students from first year and 24 students from second year became eligible for the award of Government of India Merit-cum-Means Scholarship of Rs. 1,750.

Scheduled Caste/Tribe Scholarship

Fourteen first year students and 14 second year students were awarded the SC/ST scholarship of Rs. 1,500. Of these students, five first year students and nine second year students were given the waiver of tuition fee and room rent.

Permanent Placement

An orientation programme was organized for the graduating students to discuss the factors relating to selection of companies/functions, areas

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of concern and dilemmas faced by students during the placement season, and placement norms and procedures.

The campus interviews were held between March 1 and April 10, 1978.

Out of 152 students who graduated in April 1978, 145 students sought placement assistance. All of them finalised their placement by the end of the year. In the placement interviews, 116 companies participated and 247 executives visited the campus for interviewing students. Eighty three organizations made job offers and 46 of them finalized their selection, involving 118 job offers on campus.

The public sector organizations accounted for 31% of the companies which conducted interviews and 37% of the jo offers made. Of the students placed, 38% were in public sector.

All the 14 SC/ST students accepted offers from the public sector.

Summer Placement

164 first year students (including four Fellow Programme students)
were placed in 85 organizations for summer training of 8-10 weeks. An
orientation programme was organized to discuss the objectives of the
summer placement, problems encountered in selection of companies/assignments, problems during summer placement, and norms and procedures.
Admissions to the 1978-80 Class

For admission to the Post-Graduate Programme commencing July 1978, 5,419 applications, including 216 applications for the Specialization.

Programme in Agriculture, were received. The admission test was held

on January 1, 1978, at 15 centres. On the basis of past academic record and test scores, 550 candidates were called for interviews at Ahmedabad, Bangalore, Bombay, Calcutta, Delhi, Hyderabad, Kanpur, and Madras in March—April, 1978. The group discussion was deleted from the selection procedure. Finally, 179 candidates (including 18 students for specialization in Agriculture Management) were selected.

Special efforts were made to get larger number of applications from Scheduled Caste/Tribe Candidates. Relaxations were given to them in all segments of selection procedures. Out of 218 applicants 19 SC/ST candidates were selected.

Preparatory Programme for Weaker Sections

The experience in conducting the Remedial Programme in English and Mathematics during the last few years has been mixed. Though the programme was very useful, according to student feedback, there was a feeling that the students were not able to get the maximum benefit on account of the short duration of the programme.

A faculty committee which studied this issue recommended an Extended Remedial Programme of 4 to 5 weeks duration for the weaker sections of the community to enable them to cope with their studies at this Institute. The Committee recommended that, in addition to English and Mathematics, basic concepts of Accounting be included in the programme.

Considering these recommendations, the Fifth Remedial Programme was fitled as Preparatory Programme and was conducted for four weeks

instead of three weeks from May 29 to June 24, 1978. The programme had three subjects — English, Mathematics, and Accounting.

IV. FELLOW PROGRAMME IN MANAGEMENT .

Recognition of the Programme

The Government of India has recognized the Institute's Fellow Programme as equivalent to a Ph.D. degree in Management for purposes of recruitment to superior posts and services in the government.

The government also suggested that the Fellow Programme be divided into two parts: Part I consisting of two year's introductory courses in all areas and advanced courses in the area of specialization and Part II consisting of collection of data, writing of the dissertation, and defending it before the dissertation committee in addition to Part I course work. Students who complete the first part may be awarded the title of "Associate of the Institute." and the students who complete the second part may be awarded the title of "Fellow of the Institute". Subsequently the FPM Committee has finalized a proposal outlining the Associate Programme in Management (APM).

Conferment of the Title of Fellow of IIMA

The following six students completed the programms during the year and were awarded the title of "Fellow of the Indian Institute of Management, Ahmedabad" at the 13th Annual Convocation held on April 1, 1978.

Progress of Students in the First, Second, and Third Years

Nine students joined the first year in July, 1977. Seven of them completed the course work and were promoted to the second year. One student fell sick and missed the whole of the third term; he has been permitted to repeat the third term next year. Another student was asked to withdraw from the programme as he could not fulfil the minimum academic standards.

There were twelve students in the second year. They have completed their course work.

Twelve students in the third year completed their qualifying examinations and started work on their thesis research.

Curriculum Review

The FPM Committee reviewed the curriculum for FPM students. A general restructuring of first and second year curriculum was considered desirable. A committee appointed to review the curriculum suggested changes in the curriculum. The report will be placed before the faculty for further consideration.

Advanced Courses

Second year FPM students were persuaded to take more FPM courses rather than PGP courses. The FPM Committee decided that each second year FPM student must take at least seven FPM courses during the year. During 1977-78, 35 advanced FPM courses were offered in six areas of specialization against 31 courses in 1976-77.

To familiarize FPM students with research methodologies in social sciences, a non-credit FPM Seminar on various research methods was organized. Besides FPM students, a few faculty members also attended the seminar.

Thesis Defence

Cuidelines were developed for the formation of Thesis Advisory

Committee for students. A more inter-disciplinary viewpoint as well

as a strong element of methodology was brought to bear on the student

by the choice of faculty and outside experts as members of the Thesis

Advisory Committee. Following the suggestion of the Board of Governors,

several outside experts were associated with both the Thesis Advisory

and the Thesis Examination Committees.

Six students competed for the 1977-78 IFCI Dissertation Proposal

Each award of Rs. 2,000 is given from the interest earned on an endowment created by the Industrial Finance Corporation of India to promote excellence in research.

FAIR Research Grants to FPM Students

Beginning 1978-79, the Foundation to Aid Industries to Recover (FAIR), New Delhi, has agreed to provide the Fellow Programme in Management a revenue grant of Rs. 2,000 per year for field research and professional publication expenses.

Publication of Theses Abstracts

Abstracts of all the theses of IIMA Fellows were published in two booklets — one consisting abstracts from 1974 to 1977 and the other for 1978 — to bring to the notice of teachers, researchers, and practitioners in India and abroad the work done by IIMA Fellows.

Admissions

For admission to the programme beginning July 1978, 563 applications were received. Special efforts were made to attract more and more management teachers to the programme. Applications from

teachers have gone up from 14.8% (last year) to 18.6% this year.

Based on academic background, performance in admission test, relevance of work experience, career motivation, research abilities, and area evaluation 61 candidates were called for interviews at Ahmedabad. Forty—seven candidates appeared for the interview, and 12 candidates were finally offered admission.

V. MANAGEMENT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMMES

The Institute's management development programmes continued to focus attention on the most urgent problems, areas, and sectors of management development rather than offer repetitive programmes. Six new programmes were offered. The mix of programmes for general management, sectoral management, and functional management continued to reflect the range and variety of needs in management development. In all, 22 programmes were offered during the year.

There was an increase in the participation from government, semigovernment, and public sector organizations. The number of participants
from the public and government sectors was 441 as against 300 from the
private sector. In all 507 organizations sponsored 741 executives
to the Institute's programmes during the year.

New Programmes

On behalf of the Department of Personnel and Administrative Reforms, Government of India, the Institute conducted a Programme on Project Identification, Formulation, and Appraisal for senior and middle level officers responsible for development administration in Central and State Governments and public sector undertakings. This programme will be repeated during September-October, 1978.

Under the sponsorship of the Electronics Commission of India, the Institute offered a Three-Month Advanced Programme on Computer Based Information Systems Analysis and Design. This programme was aimed at developing computer professionals for designing computer-based information systems in government, public and private organizations. Such

an advanced programme was offered for the first time in India. The programme will be offered again from July 9 to October 7, 1978.

Realising the need to provide a basic understanding of the materials management function, which has assumed a greater importance in the public and private sector organizations, the Institute organized a Programme on Materials Planning and Control for senior executives from medium and large public and private sector organizations.

To provide an understanding of the role of product planning in formulating marketing and corporate strategies and to explore the emerging concepts, techniques, and analytical approaches in product policy and new product decisions, the Institute offered for the first time a Programme on Product Policy and New Product Decisions for the executives concerned with marketing and corporate planning.

The Institute conducted a workshop on organizational diagnosis and development for top management executives to discuss the issues in organizational development (OD) in India; approaches to organizational diagnosis; developing an integrated organization and redesigning of large organizations and strategies for introducing OD.

To meet the increasing demand from universities and educational institutions for advanced orientation courses, the Institute conducted programmes for university teachers in various disciplines. This year, a new programme on Human Resource Management was introduced.

General Management Programmes

The 3-Tier Programme for Management Development, the oldest and the largest of the Institute's programmes, was conducted for the fifteenth time. The programme content was based on the concept that management development in an organization would be more effective if the management development activity was viewed in the perspective of the total organization and change was initiated simultaneously at different levels. In the programme, therefore, managers from three different levels - Middle, Senior and Top - participated in exploring and understanding management problems.

The objective of Tier I was to enhance the managerial skills of middle level executives to shoulder increasing responsibilities in the future. Tier I was organized in several modules, to deal with concepts and techniques relevant to different functional areas and to develop an organizational approach.

Tier II examined important managerial issues and to develop fresh insights into formulating plans, evaluating performance, and exercising control in functional areas as well as the entire organization.

The focus of top management seminar was on the analysis of the main environmental aspects of Indian Industry in relation to organi—zational tasks of top level managers and administrators. The seminar had three modules: Analysis of Economic Environment, Strategies and process of corporate planning and organizational design, and Management

and Development of Human Resources.

Besides the 3—Tier Programme, the Institute offered the eighth session of the general management programme for Medium and Small Enterprises. The programme focussed on concepts and skills needed for improving the productivity and efficiency of medium and small organizations. The choice of the course content was guided by the felt needs of various entrepreneurs. The programme also drew upon the research conducted at the Institute on problems of small entrepreneurs.

Functional Programmes

Two programmes in Personnel Management were organized for executives in line and service departments who manage human resources. Topics such as manpower planning, selection, Human resources, development including training and performance evaluation, wages and salary administration, welfare and workers participation in management were discussed.

To develop personal effectiveness of the managers, a laboratory programme on management of Executive Stress and Organizational conflicts was organized.

To provide a conceptual basis for planning and designing management information systems in organizations and for the role that computers can play in supporting management activities, a programme on planning, Control, and Management Information Systems was offered for senior and middle level managers who develop and control computer-

based information systems.

A laboratory on Management of Motivation was organized for the second time to help the managers to recognize their own motivational patterns and to help them examine the implications of their motivational profiles to their effectiveness in various roles in their organizations.

A Workshop on Creative Problem Solving was organized for the second time on developing or strengthening the ability of participants to find original but useful solutions to work-related problems by using specific techniques.

It is widely recognized that management achievements are increasingly influenced by the climate of industrial relations existing within the organization as well as in the social, economic, and political environment. To help the participants increase their effectiveness in dealing with problems of industrial relations, a Programme on Changing Patterns of Industrial Relations was organized by the Institute.

Sectoral Programmes

At the instance of the North-Eastern Council, the Centre for Management in Agriculture organized for the third time Management of Agriculture and Rural Development Programmes at Shillong for administrators working on agricultural and rural development schemes. The participants were exposed not only to the general problems of rural development and the tools and techniques necessary for the

success of the integrated systems in this field, but also the specific problems faced by the region itself and the strengths and limitations of the governmental systems. Officials of Arunachal Pradesh, Assam, Manipur, Meghalaya, Mizoram, Nagaland, and Tripura participated in the programme.

In view of the national priorities, the CMA offered for the fourth time a programme on Management of Rural Development for officials of the Central and State Governments and others involved in rural development programmes.

Another programme on Agricultural Management was offered by the CMA. This programme covered problems relating to agricultural inputs, agro-industries, and agricultural credits. The specific problems faced by farmers in using the physical and financial inputs and the dynamics of consumer behaviour in rural areas were also discussed.

A professional Development Programme for Trade Union Leaders of Gujarat, sponsored by the Government of Gujarat, was offered for the third time. The objective of this programme was to help the participants develop the necessary awareness and skills to adopt a professional approach to their tasks as trade union leaders.

Population Project Unit at the Institute organized a three—week training Programme for Senior Health Officers on "Programme Implementation Monitoring and Evaluation — Health and Family Planning." This programme was sponsored by the Training Division, Department of Personnel and Administrative Reforms.

Long Duration Programme

The second Management Education Programme was held from November 16 to April 5, 1978. The programme was designed to provide an intensive post-entry exposure in all areas of management for executives who had 7 to 10 years functional experience and were identified to have the potential to move to general management positions. This third programme is scheduled from November 5 to April 6, 1979. University Teachers Programme

The Programme in Managerial Economics for University Teachers
was offered for the third time. In addition, a mew programme on
Human Resource Management was also organized.

Perspective of Management Development Programmes

The management development programmes at the Institute have broadened their scope from enterprise management to the management of non-profit service organizations, public systems, governmental administration, and educational institutions. The plan for the future is to strengthen such activities through research on problems of current relevance and national importance.

During the coming academic year, the Institute is planning to offer an intensive programme on Training for Rural and Agricultural Development Efforts, a programme for Management of Forestry, and Handloom Management Training Programme. Educations Systems Unit at the Institute is planning a series of programmes for educationists. Similarly, the Population Project Unit is planning a series of training programmes on Health and Family Planning.

The new Industrial Policy announced by the Union Minister of Industry on December 23, 1977, has laid great stress on the development of small scale and rural industries in the country. Under this policy it has been decided to develop in each district an industrial centre having eight managers — seven functional and one general manager. The Institute will train 100 general managers and 30 marketing managers. The Institute will conduct in all six programmes — five batches of general managers programme (20 each), and one batch of marketing managers (30) during July—August, 1976. These programmes will be under the sponsorship of the Ministry of Industry, Department of Industrial Development, Government of India.

VI. RESEARCH, PUBLICATIONS, AND CONSULTING

In the academic year 1977-78, apart from the two sectoral groups

-- the Public Systems Group and the Centre for Management in Agriculture

-- and the projects financed by the Centre for Regional Management

Studies, we had 27 research projects sponsored by IIMA and outside

agencies.

The projects include two major research efforts. The main objective of the first study on "Decision Criteria for Exercise of Convertibility Options by Financial Institutions" is to examine the existing models/methodologies and to develop the most appropriate model for the option of converting loan into equity by financial institutions. The second study is on Career, Progress and Mobility of Management Graduates of Selected Institutions".

PUBLICATIONS

Vikalpa, the Institute's quarterly journal, has completed the second year of its publication. The journal includes original and stimulating articles based on managerial, organizational research, and consulting experiences.

The papers presented at the round-table meeting on textile policy were published under the title "Some Aspects of Textile Policy". VII. CENTRE FOR MANAGEMENT IN AGRICULTURE

CMA Looks Ahead

This year the Centre for Management in Agriculture drew up a perspective plan for its future development. A small committee was set up to explore the areas of future concern for the Centre.

As a result, the Centre has come to the conclusion that while efforts on commodity systems, modern inputs, and rural development and administration needed to be continued, the Centre must also concern itself with subsectors of agriculture that have so far not received adequate research attention like forestry, agro—industries, fisheries, and public distribution of agricultural products. Among the organizational systems that should receive greater attention were public systems and cooperatives. Future research efforts should look into the various subsectors, organizations, and concerns of managerial tasks, including environmental analysis, decision choices, and action.

These future directions emerged from various factors — the interests of the faculty, the emerging national priorities, and the needs of the client system. A few initial efforts were taken up during the year so that they could be developed into more thorough undertakings in the future.

Research in Progress

A five-year programme of action research and training on rural development for rural poor was taken up in 1975. The first phase of this project which was concerned with a predominantly tribal taluka in Gujarat, Dharampur has already been completed. As a follow-up of the research efforts, the state government has constituted a high level committee to facilitate the implementation of several of the activities recommended by the Dharampur study.

The second phase of the study relates to a drought prone tehsil in Udaipur district, Deogarh. A survey of the tehsil has been completed and a status report is being finalized.

Specialization in Agriculture Management

A specialization package of 16 courses was offered to 28 students of the Post-Graduate Programme specializing in Agriculture Management.

Upon graduation, all of them were placed in the organizations dealing with agriculture sector. Increasing numbers of public, cooperative, and voluntary agencies have been recruiting these graduates.

In addition, the Centre took an initial step in offering research and training programmes for two of the envisaged subsectors — handloom and forestry. In view of the handloom development programmes launched by the government, the Department of Industries, Covernment of India, requested the Institute to organize management development programmes for three years for officials concerned with handloom development. As a first step, a workshop was organized on February 10 and 11, 1978, for 37 participants to identify the training needs of the industry. Subsequently a two-week training programme was planned for September 1978.

At the request of the Government of India, the Institute has agreed to assist in the establishment of a national institute of forestry management. The primary responsibility for this work will rest with the Centre. As a first step, a workshop was organized on May 2-3, 1978, which

was attended by 45 participants. The Centre will undertake research in the area of forestry management and offer training programmes in collaboration with officials of the central and state governments and forestry corporations.

The Centre also organized two workshops. The first was held at the instance of the Indian Council of Social Science Research and its theme was public distribution of foodgrains. Sixteen participants were involved in the discussion held on September 2-3, 1977.

The second workshop was organized under the sponsorship of the Department of Personnel, Government of India, on the experiences of the small farmers development agencies. Fifty—one participants from various government and academic institutions were involved in the discussions held on June 15—17, 1978.

Future Plans

It is expected that the activities in various sectors would continue to expand. Two more—sub—units on energy and transportation sectors will be formed when the activities expand to the level sufficient to justify the formation of such units.

In addition, the focus will be to integrate experiences derived in various sectors to develop conceptual knowledge for increasing the effectiveness of public systems. Preliminary experiences indicate that cross—sectoral research is needed in the areas of design of organizations, personnel, finance, and planning, monitoring, and evaluation systems.

Sector specific management development programmes are being offered currently. The group plans to develop a one-month appreciation programme and medium-term skill development programmes for managers of public systems by 1980-81.

HEALTH & POPULATION UNIT

The Population Project Unit, funded by the India Population
Project, continued its work on Management of Population Programmes.
The most important achievement during the year was in the field of
training where the Unit completed development of training modules
for all three tiers of health management — PHC, district, and State.
The Unit also initiated institutional collaborative projects in
other developing countries. Thus, the year 1977—78 witnessed rapid
growth and diversification of the Unit's activities. In the light
of these developments, the Unit was redesignated as "Health and
Population Unit" in June 1978. The new name of the unit reflects
the Institute's concern for integrating population studies in larger
health management field.

The objective of the experiment is to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the multipurpose workers, by increased performance in Health and Family Welfare Programmes.

Singhpur PHC has been selected for this experiment since it is the only PHC where multipurpose workers scheme has been in operation for more than a year and the scheme has been working satisfactorily. It, therefore, has the fundamental ground work needed to carry out this experiment. The objective of this experiment is to be achieved through improved quantity and quality of work by the field workers, improvement in their status in the community, and increase in the job satisfaction as a result of the various inputs to be provided in the experiment. Base—lime data on PHC and worker—wise performance has been collected, family registers were modified for the purpose of planning and activities of the worker. A 6-month plan of training sessions has been worked out which will be held every month. The additional medicine budget for the multipurpose workers as well as for training has been sanctioned by the Project Implementation Unit.

A sample of 50 subcentres from 8 PHC in Saharanpur district
was selected for this study. Data was collected on various locational
variables such as distance from PHC, distance from road, population
of the headquarter village, type of subcentre facility, and the

performance of the subcentres. The data analysis is underway. Other Studies in Progress

Both the courses were attended by senior health officers of the Union Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, Rajasthan, Gujarat, Uttar Pradesh, Punjab, Maharashtra, and the Union territories of Delhi, Goa, Daman and Diu.

At the request of the Family Planning Association of India, a six—day training course on "Management Development Programme" was conducted at Gandhinagar (Gujarat) from November 28 to December 3, 1977.

Twenty—eight officers from the Family Planning Association of India participated in the programme.

An eight—day Management Training programme for PHC Dcotors was held at Mount Abu from February 24 to March 3, 1978. Forty doctors from forty PHCs in U.P. participated in the training programme. Seminar

Technical assistance was provided for the "National Seminar on Management of Family Welfare Programme in the Organized Sector," which was held in New Delhi from February 21 to 24, 1978. This seminar was organized by the Ministry of Labour, Government of India, in collaboration with the International Labour Organization. Professors J.K. Satia and Nirmala Murthy presented a paper on "National Strategy for Family Welfare Programmes in the Organized Sector."

A one-day workshop on "Nirodh Marketing" was held in December, 1977. The Nirodh marketing executives of the Government of India and the executives from the Clarion Advertising Services Ltd., Bombay, participated in the workshop.

International Academic Contacts

The Unit has been given a research grant by the International Committee for Management of Population Programmes to conduct research, consultancy, and training projects in other developing countries.

Work has been initiated in Egypt and Tanzania.

The Egyptian Population and Family Planning Brard invited
Professor R.M. Maru to initiate a comparative study of community
participation in Egypt and India. Professor Maru visisted Cairo from
December 28, 1977, to January 10, 1978, and collected material for a
case study. The report is expected to be completed by July, 1978.

During this visit further areas of collaboration were identified,
and two Egyptian officials visited the Institute for two weeks in
April, 1978.

Professor J.K. Satia visited the East African Management Institute (EAMI) Arusha, Tanzania, from March 28 to April 5, 1978. His visit resulted in identification of training needs for health officials of the eight East African countries. It was decided that a team of IIMA faculty members would collaborate with EAMI faculty in developing teaching materials for an 8-week health management training programme.

A training manual on "Management of Family Planning Clincics" has been prepared by Professors J.K. Satia and T.V. Rac for the Workshop

on Develor mentof Modular Training Materials for Management of Family Planning Programme conducted by the Asian Centre for Development Administration at Kaula Lumpur in August 1977.

Professors Samuel Paul and R.M. Maru attended the Executive Committee Meeting of the International Committee for Management of Population Programme (ICOMP) at Manila from March 16—19, 1978.

Professor J.K. Satia attended the Sixth International Workshop on Research in the Management of Population Programmes held at Quail Roost Conference Centre on an invitation from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He wrote a chapter on the Status Survey of Management Research in Population Programmes of India, Pakistan, Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, and Nepal.

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IX. COMPUTER CENTRE

3—Month Advanced Programme on Computer Based Information Systems Analysis and Design (August 7 to November 5, 1977)

An advanced professional training programme of this level in the area of computer use in management was organized in India for the first time. The programme attracted executives from the government, public and private sectors, and various developing countries. There were 31 participants, including two from Kenya and one from Indonesia for the first programme. Apart from the regular class sessions, the participants worked on several projects relating to computer applications in government and industry. The Department of Electronics, Government of India, gave grant-in-aid for this programme.

National Seminar on Computers and Management: Applications in Government and Industry (November 4 and 5, 1977)

This seminar was inaugurated by Professor M.G.K. Menon, Chairman, Electronics Commission. More than 100 delegates from the government, industry, and academic institutions participated in the seminar. The seminar was aimed at exploring various application areas where computer could be used for management decision—making in government and industry. - Computers in Modelling: A Case of Family Planning Programme, by Dr S.C. Bhatnagar, IIM, Ahmedabad.
- Monitoring Systems for Primary Health Centres by Dr J.K. Satia, IIM, Ahmedabad.

Research Projects in Progress

- Information Retrieval from Data Banks for Development Planning.
- 2. Graphic Applications in Management.
- 3. Computer-Based Information System for Materials Management.
- 4. Design of an Inventory System on Micro Computer.

- 5. Mini-Computer Based Integrated Data Analysis Package.
- 6. Information System for Teacher Transfer and Location and Upgrading of Schools (in collaboration with the Education Systems Unit of the Public Systems Group).
- 7. Computer Model for City Transport.

Application and System Programming Library

A number of software packages (systems and applications) were developed in various areas of management to improve the performance of the computer system. Twenty—five application packages were developed during the year.

Computer Use in Teaching and Research

About 20 faculty members used the computer for course development.

Computer was also used for about 25 research and consulting projects.

Programming assistance was also provided to several PGP and FPM courses, and research and consulting projects.

In addition, the participants of the University Teachers Programma and the 3-Month Advanced Programme used the computer extensively in their course and project work.

Academic Administration

Computer was used in academic administration such as Post—Graduate Programme grading. The Computer Centre undertook the processing of admission test data for all the three management institutions in India. Computerisation of work in various other administrative units is being taken up.

Outside Users

Many institutions/organizations like Sardar Patel Institute,

Institution of Engineers, School of Planning, Space Application Centre,
National Dairy Development Board, Anand, Gujarat Industrial Development
Corporation, EDP Corporation and Indian Detenators Ltd used the Institute's
Computer Centre facilities.

Expansion of Computer Facilities

To meet the growing demand of computer by students and faculty in their teaching and research programmes and to facilitate development of computer-based applications, expansion of computer facility has been planned. The new computer system is expected to be installed by the middle of 1978.

X. CENTRE FOR REGIONAL MANAGEMENT STUDIES

Management Development Programmes

A one-week evening programme on Small Industry Management was organized in July, 1977 jointly by the Centre for Regional Management Studies and the Ahmedabad Management Association. In addition to the class sessions, the small industry participants visited the Institute's Computer Centre and familiarized themselves with its operations.

The Centre organized a two-day programme on Analysis of Balance Sheets and Financial Statements in collaboration with the AMA on October 28 and 29, 1977. Forty—one participants from Ahmedabad attended the programme.

The ILO's programmed book on "How to Read a Balance Sheet" has been translated into Gujarati. It will be published soon.

Programmes for University Teachers

The CRMS helped in organizing a workshop on Creative Problem Solving for teachers from universities in Gujarat. The programme was offered by Professor Pradip Khandwalla im May 1978.

The CRMS Committee has evolved an extension lecture series on management topics to be delivered by members of the IIM faculty at different industrial/university centres in Gujarat.

The Centre provided partial financial assistance to the Gujarat based participants to the University Teachers' Programme in Managerial Economics held on the campus from May 22 to June 10, 1978.

Starting from June 1978, the CRMS will help in developing faculty and course studies for colleges which have applied for autonomous status from the Gujarat University.

Activities Related to Textile Industry

The sub-group on textile industry of the CRMS held discussions with a visiting team of the National Textile Workers' Association on October 13, 1977. The subject for discussion was Modernization in the Textile Industry. On behalf of the Centre, Mr Prafull Anubhai and Professor V.L. Mote participated.

Based on the papers presented at the Round Table on Textile

Policy held at Bombay in May 1976, a publication entitled "Some

Aspects of Textile Policy" was brought out in August, 1977. Mr Babu—

bhai J. Patel, Chief Minister of Gujarat, released the publication.

Research Project

The research project on Employees State Insurance Scheme jointly sponsored by the CRMS and the Chandraprasad Desai Memorial Trust of Arvind Mills has been completed.

XI. SEMINARS AND LECTURES

Seminar on Management Research

The second national seminar on Management Research was held at the Institute on January 19 and 20, 1978. The objective of the seminar was for inter-group and inter-disciplinary researchers to meet and discuss ideas for collaboration. Besides the Institute's faculty, 18 participants from thirteen institutions attended the seminar.

The topics for discussion were 1) Industry Studies: Policy
Aspects, 2) Industry Studies: Techniques/Methodological Aspect,
3) Industry Studies: Behavioural Aspects, and 4) Rural/Area Development Programmes. Twenty four papers covering these four areas were presented.

As an outcome of the seminar, a need was expressed for exchange of research findings and the types of research being undertaken by various institutions, which in turn, would need a data-pool.

Vikram Sarabhai Memorial Lecture

Dr V. Kurien, Chairman, National Dairy Development Board, delivered the third Vikram Sarabhai memorial lecture on "Managing Socio—Economic Change: The Role of Professionals" on March 7, 1978.

He urged "young professionals" to serve farmers to check the flight from villages to cities and to reverse the destructiveness of our urbanization. While agreeing that villages were no "idyllic

havens" for professionals to work, Dr. Kurien said that for those who wanted to try and work in villages, some factors were in their favour. For one, farmers still retained their faith in professionals and were willing to give the sincere professional a good chance to prove himself. "The majority of our people are rural and the majority of them are poor. It is time that the farmer came into his own. The professional who commits himself to this objective can work for farmers — and he will never go wrong, he will never lack allies — and he will always find a deep satisfaction from the trust reposed in him by the village people when he serves," he said.

He regretted that the gap between new cities and villages was widening and that professionals preferred to join the elite "to enjoy the fruits of the elite, while the going is good."

Austrian Model of Social Partnership

Dr. Woffgang Schallenberg, Austrian Ambassador to India, spoke on "The Austrian Model of Social Partnership" on November 21, 1977.

Harmonicus employer-employee relation was one of the main reasons for the rapid development of Austria which was reduced to shambles during World War. An important feature of the industrial scene in Austria was that unions were not affiliated to any political party. After the war, all the trade unions formed an Austrian Federation of Trade Unions which became the sole bargaining agent

for the worker. The model, which was highly institutionalized, incorporated all pressure groups and interests within itself and helped to fulfil a common objective. Both industrialists and labour helped in equal measure in settling disputes amicably.

The result of these features was that there were no strikes in Austria. Social equality was the main reason for the success of this unique model of partnership. The Austrian system has survived for over three decades to the satisfaction of most.

XII. ALUMNI ACTIVITIES

IIMA Alumnus

Three issues of <u>IIMA Alumnus</u> were published in September, May and January. The magazine continued to be the main medium of interaction between the Institute and its alumni.

Chapter Activities

Bangalore: Dr Samuel Paul, Director, IIMA, inaugurated the general body meeting of the chapter on May 24, 1977. The theme of his address was "International View of Transnational Corporations".

In August 1977, the chapter sereened four films: 1) "Getting Yourself Across," 2) "Investment Planning," 3) "How to make Effective Sales," and 4) "Seeing the Future."

In October 1977, a group discussion was held among members of the chapter regarding a project to help the educated unemployed in Bangalore by identifying opportunities which involve very low investments and procedures for obtaining loans, licences, etc., and by rendering consultancy on the efficient and profitable management of a venture.

On December 14, the members got together with Professors C.D. Menon, P.S. Sachdeva, N.R. Sheth, Pramod Verma, and Manubhai Shah (Visiting Faculty at IIMA) and had a panel discussion on "Industrial Relations after the Emergency."

Madras: On July 27, 1977, Mr. David A. Artko, Regional Vice—President of Bank of America and Vice—President of the Indo—American Chamber of Commerce, addressed the chapter on "A Partnership of Necessity: The Multi-National Corporation and the Developing Nations."

<u>Pune:</u> The Pune Chapter organized ten discussion meetings. Well-known research workers, administrators, practising executives, and government officials participated. Other management institutions in Pune were also invited.

For the first time since the Pune Chapter was formed, a one—day seminar was held on Rural Marketing at the Blue Diamond Hotel on March 4, 1978. The faculty members were drawn from IIMA, Ahmedabad, Government officials, and Executives from public and private industries and banking organizations. The seminar was attended by about 40 participants.

In collaboration with the Pune Productivity Council, a film show was arranged on Management by Objective. After the show there was a lively discussion on the applicability of MBO in the Indian context.

About 50 persons participated in this programme.

Election to the Executive Committee

The biennial elections to the Executive Committee of the IIMA Alumni Association were held in November 1977.

Mr U.V. Rao, Larsen & Toubro Ltd., Bombay; Mr. Vijay Bhargava, Hindustan Everest Tools Ltd., Delhi: and Mr R. Srinivasan, Readers. Digest, Bombay were elected President, Vice—President, and Secretary respectively. In addition, the Executive Committee has nine elected members and six coopted members.

Professor Samuel Paul, Director, Professor M. Meenakshi Malya, Chairperson, Alumni Activities Committee, and Mr R.C. Chib, Administrative Officer, IIMA, continued as ex-officio members of the committee.

The Executive Committee met on March 10, 1978, and the Annual General Meeting of the Association was held on March 11, 1976, at Bombay.

Alumni Conferences

During the year under review, there were two alumni conferences, the 12th alumni conference was held at Delhi and the 13th at Bombay.

The 12th Alumni Conference was held in Delhi on July 15 and 16, 1977. The Conference theme was "Mass Consumption Needs: Challenge to Management." Shri Mohan Dharia, Union Minister of Commerce, Civil Supplies and Cooperation, inaugurated the conference.

The topics discussed at the conference were; a) Meeting Mass

Consumption Needs: Opportunities and Strategies, b) Ensuring Fair

Prices: Experiences and Options, c) Advertising and Consumer Interests,

and d) Consumer Protection: Role of Institutional Mechanisms. Ninety—

four executives participated in the conference.

The 13th Alumni Conference on "Human Resources Development: New Frontiers" was held in Bombay on March 10 and 11, 1978. Shri V. Krish-namurthy, Secretary, Heavy Industry, Government of India, inaugurated

the conference. Three papers were presented at the conference by
the Institute Faculty: 1) Developing Young Managers: Managing
Transition (Professor Pulin K. Garg), 2) China in Bull-Pens:
Creativity in Indian Organizations (Professor Pradeep N. Khardwalla),
3) Some Issues in Designing Human Resources Development (Professor
Udai Pareek). A panel discussion on "Moving Towards New Frontiers"
concluded the two-day conference. Ninety-nine executives participated in the conference.

B.K. Hegde and Warren Haynes Memorial PGP Scholarship:

Rs. 46,201.86 have been collected from alumni and others as against the target of Rs. 60,000. Out of the interest earned on this donation, two scholarships of Rs. 1,500 have been offered to the Post-Graduate Programme students.

XIII. EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES

LIBRARY

During the year, 5,046 new books were added to the library, bringing the total number of books to 88,526. The Library has been subscribing to 800 periodicals, of which 27 were added during the year. Annual reports of 57 companies were acquired during the year increasing the total number of comapnies to 2800 (Indian & Foreign).

The Library brought out a monthly "List of Selected New Books on Management and Related Disciplines."

The Library also planned to start the following new services:


- 1. Subject index of articles in current periodicals on mamagement and related disciplines. (This list will include the articles published in various Indian and Foreign periodicals on the subject).
