

I AN OVERVIEW FOR THE YEAR

The various academic and related activities of the Institute maintained a steady pace of performance during 1984-85. In the background of the recommendations made by the Committee on Future Directions in 1984, a faculty committee reviewed the various aspects of the post-graduate programme to make it more effective in meeting the emerging demands in the environment as well as in responding to the accumulated experience of faculty, students and the user community. It is felt that we should keep in mind the inherent strengths of the programme while introducing changes in it to respond to the internal and external needs. It has been decided to appoint a small faculty committee to review the structure and form of the programme in this spirit. We are quite hopeful that our effort in this matter will help the Institute to improve its quality and strength. Some of the changes that may be introduced in the post-graduate programme will also have a correspondingly welcome effect on the fellow programme in management as well as the faculty development programme, both of which partly share the content of the post-graduate programme.

Some concern about the effectiveness and usefulness of the faculty development programme was expressed in annual report of the previous year. In view of this a faculty committee reviewed the programme in It was a pleasant surprise for all its dimensions. us that most of the alumni of this programme and their sponsors provided a positive feedback on it and recommended that it should continue. faculty has begun to consider the ways in which the faculty development programme can be strengthened to yield better results from all points of view and be integrated in a broader effort on the part of the Institute to improve the quality of management education in the country. This issue is currently receiving the attention of the appropriate authority in the Government of India at the highest level. We hope that the review in progress at the Institute will lead to the development of a suitable strategy for us to provide meaningful help to the Government in this area.

In the field of management development programmes, the Institute's community is happy that the 3-Tier programme, which is one of the most established and

popular short-term programmes offered since the Institute's inception, was held at our management development centre for the first time during the year. In view of the very large participation in the first two tiers of this programme, we had to be extremely careful to ensure that conducting the programme on our campus would not imply serious managerial problems at the Institute of inconvenience to the participants. I am happy to report that these programmes were held without any significant difficulty on any side due to the excellent team work among the faculty and staff concerned and the positive response we received from the participants. This experience has given us adequate confidence about our ability to organise similar efforts whenever necessary. The decision of the Bureau of Public Enterprises to invite our collaboration for the Advance Management Programme (AMP) for chief executives of public enterprises reinforced our strength and confidence in this regard. We held the AMP twice during the year and received extremely encouraging response in all respects from all concerned parties. This programme incidentally helped us a great deal in streamlining and improving

some of our physical facilities in the management development centre. We are indeed grateful to the Bureau of Public Enterprises and the advisory committee on AMP for all the help, support and encouragement we received from them.

As reported at relevant places in the following pages, our research activities among the major research groups as well as the general faculty have continued and grown in conformity with our past practice. We, however, need to make considerably greater effort in this area and also spend much more time than at present on development of new case material in all areas and sectors. have now merged the administration of case research with the corresponding work on project research. This merger is likely to yield some desirable results in enhancing our research activity. The Research and Publications Committee has recently compiled some relevant information about the cases, technical notes and working papers prepared by faculty in each group over the years. This information leads up to an encouraging conclusion that we need not be as self-critical about our research and related output as we sometimes are.

The consulting projects undertaken by faculty during the year indicate an increasing trend towards application of the faculty's professional expertise and interest to resolution of practical managerial problems in public enterprises and, more importantly, in the priority sectors of the economy. The Institute has also been involved increasingly in assisting government departments and agencies in reviewing and resolving their concrete management problems.

The committee appointed by the Board of Governors in 1984 to recommend appropriate measures for a suitable memorial to the late Professor Ravi J.

Matthai has recommended the establishment of a Centre for Educational Innovation. While the details on this proposal are still under consideration, the committee has suggested that a multipurpose auditorium should be built as part of the proposed mirror-image of the existing structure known as the main complex. This physical facility will, however, be a part of a set of training and research programmes which will be designed with due attention to creating a fitting memorial for a person

of Prof. Matthai's stature and commitment. I am glad to report that the Ford Foundation has offered us a generous grant to establish a programme for training and research in development entrepreneurship toward integrated socio-economic development of the underprivileged sections of the rural population. We also contemplate programmes in the area of institution-building and management of educational systems as important parts of the proposed Matthai Memorial.

I am happy to report that Mr. K.C. Pant, the Honourable Minister for Education, spent a good deal of his time with a group of the Institute's faculty on April 1, 1985 when he visited us as the chief guest for our Convocation. As a result of our discussions with him, Mr. Pant and his colleagues in the Ministry have asked for our assistance in some aspects of the new education policy which is currently on the anvil. A faculty group has submitted some relevant ideas, reflections and proposals in this regard and we have continued our interaction with the Government with a view to providing the necessary help within the

limits of our competence. We have also during the past few months received requests from various other ministries of the Union Government for concrete help in relation to specific issues in dealing with some problems of national importance.

The Institute is aware that it is essential to keep pace with the rapid changes taking place in application of electronics technology to management In this context, our education and practice. Computer and Information Systems Group has planned to procure new sophisticated computer equipment in the next few months under the Computer Aided Management Project. Apart from this, we have also decided to buy an adequate number of micro processors which will soon become an integral part of management education both in relation to our long-term as well as short-term programmes. This new equipment is likely to help the Institute in maintaining its pioneering role in management training and research. Similarly, we have planned to introduce suitable electronic equipment for printing and reproduction of our teaching and research material. This will help us to improve the quality of reading material in all areas, reduce wastage of stationary and

equipment and rationalise the overall effort to provide to the reader more readable and presentable material.

The Institute's community is deeply aware that its level of performance and achievements in various areas would not be possible but for the help and support from the Government of India, the Government of Gujarat, the various organisations constituting its client system and the community at large. behalf of all colleagues, I wish to express our gratitude to everyone who has directly or indirectly helped the Institute in fulfilling its commitments and maintaining its usefulness and acceptability. Obviously all members of the Institute's internal community, including faculty, research staff and administrative staff have also contributed a great deal to the Institute's performance by their dedication and hard work. I would like to express appreciation and gratitude for this contribution.

Dr. I.G. Patel relinquished charge as director on July 13, 1984 and took over as director of the London School of Economics and Political Science in October 1984. Mr. Keshub Mahindra was asked by Government of

India in July 1984 to continue as Chairman of the IIMA Society and Board of Governors until his successor was appointed. He relinquished charge on July 29, 1985 upon the appointment of Mr. V. Krishnamurthy, Chairman of Steel Authority of India Limited as the Institute's On behalf of everyone associated with the Institute I would like to place on record our deep gratitude to Mr. Mehindra for all the efforts he made during the eleven years of his tenure as chairman to sustain and strengthen the Institute's character and help it grow in an exemplary spirit of supportive leadership. Mr. Krishnamurthy has been a friend of the Institute for a very long time and has also been associated with its Society and Board of Governors during recent years. We welcome Mr. Krishnamurthy as our new Chairman. His distinguished record as a professional manager, personal qualities and experience as an organisational leader are widely known to the Institute's community. We look forward to continuing reinforcement of the Institute's strength and image and progress towards achievement of its basic objectives and performance of its emerging role in India's plans for modernization.

by Shri Ashoke Chatterji, Executive Director, National
Institute of Design, Ahmedabad.

Professors S.C. Kuchhal, Ranjit Gupta (till December 31, 1984), N.C.B. Nath, and G.R. Kulkarni (till October 31, 1984) respectively continued to hold the IFCI Chair of Management, the SBI Chair of Rural Development, the STC Chair in International Trade, and Bank of Baroda Chair in International Banking and Finance.

III POST-GRADUATE PROGRAMME IN MANAGEMENT

The Twenty-first session of the Post-Graduate Programme in Management (1984-86 batch) began on July 2, 1984 with an enrolment of 175 students. In addition, two students of 1983-85 batch who failed to fulfil conditional promotion requirements at the end of the first term, were required to repeat the first year programme, beginning the second term. Ten first year students discontinued their studies during the year for various reasons. One of them was permitted to rejoin the programme during the academic year 1985-86 on medical grounds. One student died in tragic circumstances during the year.

The first year class strength as at the end of the year was 166, including the two repeaters. The 1984-86 batch includes 27 students belonging to SC/ST. Out of the 166 students in the first year programme, 18 will specialize in agricultural management during the second year of their studies. The second year programme (1983-85 batch) commenced on June 25, 1984 with an enrolment of 178 students. One of them has proceeded abroad for higher studies. One was granted one year medical leave. At the end of the first

term, one student discontinued his studies on account of pressing family problems. The student has been permitted to rejoin the second year programme, commencing the second term. during the academic year 1985-86. student of 1982-84 batch who took ill during the second year second term (academic year 1983-84) and who was permitted to rejoin the second year programme, returned to his studies in the second term. Out of the four second year students who failed to fulfil the conditional promotion requirements, two rejoined the first year programme, as per the conditions laid down, beginning the second term. One of the students went in appeal to the High Court and his appeal was dismissed. He then withdrew from the programme on his own. One of the students who was permitted to continue in the second year programme with the condition that he fulfils the first year course requirements simultaneously, could not meet the specified academic requirements and therefore would be required to return to the Institute during the academic year 1985-86 to complete the first year course requirements.

Thus, at the end of the second year, 172 students had satisfactorily completed the academic requirements for graduation from the Institute. This included 26 specializing in agricultural management and 18 belonging to SC/ST.

During the year as per the recommendation of the FPM Executive Committee, after considerable discussions, one of the third year FPM students was permitted to join the Post-Graduate Programme and complete the course requirements.

Preparatory Programme

Fifty-four candidates who were identified to be deficient in basic mathematics and/or communication on the basis of their academic background, performance in the admission test and interviews, were called to attend the Preparatory Programme which was held from June 4 to 23, 1984. Most of these candidates belonged to the weaker sections of society.

Curriculum

During the year the first year students had to study 22 compulsory courses, 7 each in the first two-terms and 8 in the third term.

In the second year programme (General), 37 elective courses were offered in addition to a two unit compulsory course in Business Policy. Moreover, 37 one-term project courses were offered to 68 students in the areas of their interest. One student had pursued a Course of Independent Study (CIS) equivalent to two units of courses.

In the second year programme (Specialization in Agricul-tural Management) 10 compulsory courses inclusive of a project course and 8 elective courses were offered.

Two students had opted for the CIS.

Institute Lecture Series

In this year's lecture series, Shri Arun Shourie delivered a lecture at the Institute on January 28, 1985. The theme was "Gandhiji's ways and Ours". Dr. Raj Krishna, Professor of Economics, University of Delhi, gave a talk on the "Dimensions of Poverty in India" on March 16, 1985.

Students' Exchange Visit

During the last few years, the students of IIM, Ahmedabad, Calcutta, and Bangalore have been paying goodwill visits to the other Institutes in rotation. During the current academic year, IIM Bangalore had hosted the visit from October 24 to 28, 1984. Forty-three students of this Institute had visisted Bangalore and had participated in various events such as sports, debates, management games and other social, cultural, and academic activities.

Admission of Foreign Students

Of the three French students from ESSEC Graduate School of Management, France selected to spend a term at the Institute, only one student reported at the Institute and took regular courses in the second year, second term, during the current academic year. The grades obtained by the student were communicated to her parent institution which had recognized IIMA's courses as equivalent to their own. This visit was part of the exchange programme which the IIMA had entered into with ESSEC.

Graduation of 1983-85 Batch

One hundred and sixty-eight students of 1983-85 class including 26 students with specialization in agricultural management were awarded the Institute's Post-Graduate Diploma in Management at the 20th Annual Convocation held on April 1, 1985. Shri. K.C. Pant, Minister of Education Government of India delivered the Convocation address. The following three students received the "Indian Institute of Management, Ahmedabad Medals for Scholastic Performance":

Committee on Future Directions of PGP

A committee was constituted in February 1984 to consider the recommendations of the Committee on Future Directions with regard to PGP, the discussions thereon in the faculty meeting, and the Report of the Task Force on PGP constituted by the CFD. The Committee's terms of reference also included specific recommendations with regard to the SPA. The Committee has since completed its task and has submitted the report which will be discussed by the faculty soon.

Course Review

A review of the first year courses was conducted during the academic year 1976-77 and the existing course package was implemented beginning academic year 1977-78. In the light of our experience in offering the courses, it is proposed to undertake a comprehensive review of the courses early next year.

Review of Academic Performance and Promotion Policy in PGP
In the faculty meeting held on October 1, 1984, it was
decided that the general principles and practices pertaining to the conditions of promotion from PGP I to PGP II

should be reviewed in the light of accumulated experience. Accordingly, the PGP Executive Committee was requested to undertake a review of the current norms and practices on promotion and make necessary recommendations that could be discussed in the PGP Committee to take final decision in this matter.

The PGP Committee has considered the recommendations of the PGP Executive Committee and has approved the guidelines suggested while considering academic performance of students at the end of the year for promotion to second year. It has, however, been decided not to make any changes in the existing academic standards for promotion to the second year of the programme.

ADMISSION

The Post-Graduate Programme commencing July 1985 attracted 9,165 applications. The comparative figures for this year and the last year are given below:

Relaxations were given to the SC/ST applicants in all segments of the selection procedure. SPA applicants were also given relaxations in some segments of selection.

FINANCIAL AID

Loans

This year also loan applications were not recommended to the SBI and no loans were granted from the IIMA Loan Fund

because many nationalized banks were giving loans to the students for higher studies at a slightly lower rate of interest. Moreover, it was easier for the students to obtain loans to complete the formalities speedily at the bank branches located at the students hometowns.

Efforts were made to recover the outstanding loans granted from the IIMA Loan Fund. Out of 31 loan recovery cases, an amount of Rs. 11,321.88 was recovered and six cases were closed. The remaining 25 cases were being pursued.

- C. Government of India Merit-cum-Means Scholarships

D. IIMA Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes Scholarships

During 1984-85, all the 28 students (including two repeaters) in the first year and all the 18 students in the second year were awarded this scholarship of Rs. 1,500 each. Of these students, seven from the first year and seven from the second year were given waiver of tuition fee and foom rent of Rs. 1130 each.

IV FELLOW PROGRAMME IN MANAGEMENT

So far, 66 students have completed the requirements for Fellow Programme in Management, and another 38 students are currently at various stages of completing the programme.

Admissions

This year 343 candidates applied for admissions to FPM.

Out of which 64 candidates were called for interview.

Admission was offered to 18 students of which 10 joined the programme in July 1984.

Under the Students Exchange Programme, the Institute was offered during this year two scholarships, one by the French Government and another by ESSEC University, France for Doctoral students. The French Government scholarship would be availed during 1985.

Placement

Out of the 10 candidates who have been awarded the Title of "Fellow of IIMA" during the 1985 convocation, six have joined the academic institutions and the other four have accepted offer from industry.

V FACULTY DEVELOPMENT CENTRE

The FDC offered the Sixth Faculty Development Programme in Management from June 25, 1984 to April 13, 1985.

Eleven participants from various educational and professional institutions from India and Nepal participated in the programme.

In the summer of 1984, the FDC Committee undertook a promotion campaign and visited 24 institutions to understand their faculty development needs and to build inter-institutional linkages.

The FDC Committee had planned to organize a conference of the Vice-Chancellors and Heads of Management Departments of selected universities to discuss management education programmes in the country and the role the FDC can play in improving the standards. This conference was originally scheduled to be held in October 1984, but could not be held during the academic year. A workshop on the case method was also planned for the summer of 1985. This workshop is now likely to be held in September.

During the year, a committee was appointed by the Director to review the FDP. The committee has submitted its report which the faculty will look into.

VI RESEARCH AND PUBLICATIONS

At the end of the academic year 1983-84, three research projects and 11 seed grant projects sponsored by the Research and Publications Committee, were in progress. During the academic year 1984-85, one research project and 12 seed grant projects were initiated. One research project and three seed grant projects were completed, and one seed grant project was dropped during the year. Publications

Vikalpa: A quarterly journal published by the Institute has completed the eighth year of publication. The journal includes original and stimulating articles based on managerial and organizational research and consulting experience.

In addition, the faculty and staff published 12 books and 13 monographs and wrote 58 articles or chapters in books in India and abroad. They also presented 60 papers and gave 21 lectures in various seminars and conferences. In addition, 53 working papers were brought out. For details, please see Appendix IX.

Consulting

Forty-one consultancy projects were initiated and 28 were completed during the year. The clientele included several international agencies, central and state governments, public and private sector organizations, cooperatives, banking institutions, voluntary agencies, and sponsors of the small scale industry.

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VII MANAGEMENT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMMES

Three of the 26 management development programmes offered during the year were new. The mix of programmes for general management, sectoral management, and functional management as usual reflected the range and variety of needs in management development.

Participation from government, semi-government, and public sector organizations continue to increase.

The number of participants from the public and government sector was 494 as against 367 from private sector. In all 616 organizations sponsored 861 executives to the Institute's programmes this year.

New Programmes

The Institute offered two Advanced Management
Programmes for Public Enterprises in collaboration
with Bureau of Public Enterprises, Government of
India, for senior managers who would assume top
management positions. The programme was designed
for the purpose of developing and equipping participants with the necessary knowledge, skills, and
attitudes for the challenging multifunctional tasks

of top management in the context of societal and national role of enterprises. The programme design had four modules incorporating diverse and very important inputs and experiences. The first module extending over four weeks consisted of academic instructions comprising faculty inputs and collective experience of participants. The other modules were: a) Study tour of two-weeks duration to a foreign country to study the prevalent management practices and systems, with a view to improve the quality of management in the Indian public sector. first programme the participants visited Japan and Hungary in two separate groups, and in the second programme they visited USSR and Italy. •) Interface between the government and public enterprises. involved meetings consisting of briefings and discussions with relevant ministries and departments in Delhi. c) Concluding session which was designed to facilitate exchange of experiences and learning.

Total 68 participants attended these two programmes (34 in each programme).

A programme on Leasing was offered by the Institute for senior and middle level managers in leasing, manufacturing and consultancy firms, financial institutions, and other organizations concerned with leasing decisions either as lessors or lessees. The advent of leasing in India has made a significant impact on the industrial scene. The growth in the number of leasing companies and the volume of business in the last few years indicate an increasing interest in this new found method of acquiring the use of assets. However, along with growth have come uncertainties about various conceptual and practical issues. This programme provided a forum to resolve some of the uncertainties and explore the leasing phenomenon in depth. Forty-one executives attended this programme.

A three-week Management Development Programme for Social Service Managers was organized under the sponsorship of Training Division, Department of Personnel and Administrative Raforms, Government of India for senior government officers. Seventeen participants attended this programme.

General Management Programmes

The 3-Tier Programme for Management Development, the oldest and the largest of the Institute's programmes was offered for the twenty-second time. In this programme, executives from three different levels (middle, senior, and top) participated in exploring and understanding management problems. The Top Management (Tier III) segment was offered as a senior on changing environment and strategic response. Chief executives from public sector undertakings and private organizations were invited to share their experiences with the seminar participants.

One hundred and eighty-five participants attended in all the three programmes.

The Institute offered the 15th Management Development Programme for Small and Medium Enterprises, which focussed on concepts and skills needed for improving productivity and efficiency of small and medium enterprises. Twenty-four participants attended this programme.

Functional Programmes

Programmes on Marketing Docisions: Advances in Data Analysis, Data Base Management Systems: Concepts and Applications, Project Management, Management of Executive Stress, Corporate Planning, Advanced Programme in Personnel Management and Industrial Relations, Management of Technology, Human Resources and Organizational Development, Product Policy and New Product Management, Decision Support Systems were offered during the year.

Sectoral Programmes

Under the 3-Tier Programme for Health and Family
Welfare Scrvices, the Institute offered a programme
for district medical officers (DMO) and a state level
seminar on health and family welfare (Tier III) for
the senior officers of the Government of Uttar Pradesh.

A two-week management development programme for finance executives in Handloom Corporations and Cooperatives was offered under the sponsorship of Development Commissioner, Handlooms, Government of India.

A 17-day programme on Management of Agricultural and Rural Development was offered during the year.

A three-week programme for Public Systems Managers was offered under the sponsorship of Training Division, Department of Personnel and Administrative Reforms, Government of India, for senior government officers working in ministries or sectors like energy, education, health and family welfare, transportation, etc.

Long Duration Programmes

The Institute offered for the eighth time a three-month Advanced Programme on Computer-Based Information Systems Analysis and Design. This programme was aimed at developing computer professionals for designing computer-based information systems in government, public, and private organizations. This programme is being offered again.

A nine-week course on Designing Projects for Agricultural Development (sponsored by Training Division,
Department of Personnel and Administrative Reforms,
Government of India) was offered for the sixth time.
This programme is being offered again.

The Ninth Management Education programme was conducted during the year. This programme is designed to provide an intensive post-entry exposure in all areas of management for executives with functional experience who were identified to have the potential to move to general management position.

Perspective of Management Development Programmes

The programme offered by the Institute have broadened their scope from enterprise management to management of non-profit service organizations, public systems, and trade unions. The plan for the future is to strengthen such activities through research on problems of current relevance and national importance.

Programmes Envisaged

The Institute is planning to offer new programmes on Managing Organizations: Managing Young Managers, Computer-Based Management Decision Support Systems, Micro-Computers for Managers, Manufacturing Management and Policy, Training for Public Systems Trainers.

VIII CENTRE FOR MANAGEMENT IN AGRICULTURE

Traditionally, the industry has been the main focus of management science and institutions. The Indian Institute of Management, Ahmedabad, made an innovative departure by emphasizing the need to expand the use of management science to other sectors of national life: agriculture was the first nonconventional sector chosen for the purpose. Soon after the establishment of IIMA, a small group called the 'Agco Group' was set up in 1963. The group was redesignated as the Centre for Management in Agriculture (CMA) in 1971.

CMA is the largest multi-disciplinary group within the Institute. Presently it has 17 primary and 7 secondary faculty members, 17 research staff, another 10 ad hoc research staff, and a group of secretarial and administrative staff. CMA faculty members interact with the members of the other areas in the Institute and undertake joint work when necessary. There are agricultural economists, sociologists, agricultural engineers, specialists in rural communication and management, and economists among the CMA faculty.

The research efforts of the Centre have covered private, cooperative, and governmental activities in various fields such as development administration, agricultural credit, crop husbandry, animal husbandry, fisheries, poultry, forestry, major irrigation projects, command area development, rural electrification, agro-industries, rural industries, health and nutrition, farmers' education and extension, natural resource utilization, and energy. In terms of management areas these have covered planning, formulation, organization, implementation, monitoring, and evaluation. In a number of them the focus was on policy and general environment analysis. There were feasibility studies, and studies on demand estimates and market research.

Problem oriented approach, a multi-disciplinary faculty group committed to agricultural management, and a time-bound and well-coordinated schedule of work have contributed to the productivity and growth of research in CMA. These have been further strengthened by organizational and structural arrangements.

CMA has evolved a system for getting its research outputs published for wider circulation. After academic review and editing, the research reports are published in a monograph series. To date, CMA has published 110 research studies and has developed about 600 cases for training programmes in the agricultural sector.

Periodic review of research and other activities of CMA is an important instrument in planning future direction.

EDUCATIONAL AND TRAINING PROGRAMMES

Post-Graduate Programme

Twenty-six students completed the requirements of the Specialization Package in Agriculture (SPA) in the second year of the Post-Graduate Programme and were awarded the diploma.

Management Development Programmes

Management Development programme for Executives in Finance of Handloom Corporations and Cooperatives:

At the request of the Ministry of Industry, CMA developed and conducted the programme from June 11-23, 1984 at the Institute. Seventeen officials from different State Handloom Corporations participated in the programme. As part of the programme, a two-day workshop was also organized on June 22 and 23, 1984.

Management of Agricultural and Rural Development

Programme: The programme was conducted from October 5

to 21, 1984. Thirty-two participants, drawn from

financial institutions, rural development agencies and

agricultural departments personnel, public sector

industrial corporations, private industries, voluntary

agencies, and institutions involved in rural development

training, attended the programme.

Designing Projects for Agricultural Development:

CMA has been organizing this programme at the instance of the Training Division, Department of Personnel and Administrative Reforms, Government of India.

A nine-week training programme was held from November 18, 1984 to January 19, 1985. Twenty-eight senior/middle level officers involved in the preparation and implementation of development projects in agriculture, irrigation, forestry, fisheries, cooperatives, animal husbandry and dairying, rural development and other related activities participated in the programme. They were drawn from central and state government departments, cooperatives, selected financial institutions, and gricultural universities.

Seminars and Workshops

Workshop on Operational Research Projects of Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR)

along of the joint panel of ICAR-IIMA decided, along other things, that they would work to strengthen the Mational Academy of Agricultural Russarch Management (NAARM). It was envisaged that the CMA faculty would participate in the training programmes organized by the MAARM. A workshop on Operational Research Projects (ORP) of ICAR was organized jointly by NAARM and CMA

from October 29 to November 1, 1984, to discuss the case-studies of the ORPs and the field experiences of the scientists implementing them. The officers in charge of the ORPs and the personnel from the ICAR head-quarters participated in the Workshop.

The workshop had the following objectives:

- a) To study the strategy of the ORPs in the context of agricultural research management
- b) To investigate how various aspects of project management are operationalized in agricultural research management
- c) To study the real world difficulties of implementing various aspects of project management
- d) To draw lessons from the experience and casestudies of the ORPs to manage agricultural research more efficiently.

Asian Seminar on Rural Dovelopment

CMA in collaboration with the Indian Society of Agricultural Economics organized the "Asian Seminar on Rural
Development: Evaluation of the Indian Experience." The
Seminar held from December 10-14,1984 was sponsored by
the International Development Research Centre. The
seminar attempted to: 1) evaluate rural development experience in Asian countries in general and in India in
particular, and 2) identify strategies, policies, and
programmes which have succeeded or failed to achieve
the purpose of rural development.

Fort, participants, two each from Bangladesh and Nepal; one each from China, Japan, Philippines, and Thailand; three from IDRC; and 29 from India attended the seminar.

In-house Workshop

The Centre organized a two-day in-house workshop in November 1984 to review its past research work and generate ideas for future research. All members of faculty and research staff of the Centre participated in the workshop. Each faculty member made a presentation, reviewing the contribution and limitations of the research projects completed by him from the time of joining the Centre and indicating ideas and plans for future research projects.

The discussions helped in classifying the Centre's research concerns, client systems, and areas of interest as presented in Annexure 1.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The re-constituted Advisory Committee met on January 17, 1985 at IIM, Ahmedabad. Members of the Advisory Committee met the Centre's faculty and had prolonged discussion with them on the research projects completed and those in progress as well as their individual research interests. The discussion helped in acquainting the committee with the activities of the Centre and the thrust of its research and training efforts. The Committee provided valuable suggestions and guidance and endorsed the research plan of the Centre for 1985—86.

Seminar/Workshops

A top level seminar on Management of Health and Family
Welfare Services was held at the Institute from October 15-20,
1984. The Seminar was sponsored by the Government of

X CENTRE FOR REGIONAL MANAGEMENT STUDIES

The seminar on "Excess Capacity and Sickness in the Textile Industry" was jointly organized by the Industrial Development Bank of India (IDBI) and the Centre for Regional Management Studies (CRMS) on June 7, 1984 at IIMA. It was inaugurated by Shri Sanat Mehta, the then Finance Minister of Gujarat. Shri Arvind Narottam Lalbhai, Chairman and Managing Director, Arvind Mills Ltd. was in the chair. About 35 persons from textile industry, government, and academic institutions participated in the deliberations.

The two main themes of the seminar were diagnosis of the problems of sick units in the textile industry and an action plan to restore health of the industry. One of the major conclusions of the seminar was that many of the measures to alleviate sickness in the textile industry did not have desired degree of success because they did not take into account the prevalence of excess capacity in the industry.

Subsequently a number of refinements were made in the work done for the seminar. A note based on the regional approach and improved data-base was presented to the Honourable Chief Minister of Gujarat in March 1985. The diagnosis of the problem and the action plan emerging from the study were also presented to Industrial Finance Corporation of India, IDBI, and the Expert Committee on the Textile Industry appointed by the Government of India.

The seminar on "Diamond Industry of Surat and District Towns" was organized on February 25, 1985 in Surat under the joint auspices of the Department of Business and Industrial Management, South Gujarat University, the Southern Gujarat Chamber of Commerce and Industry, and CRMS. Professor Upendra Baxi, Vice-Chancellor, South Gujarat University presided over the seminar.

The seminar was based on Professor H.N. Pathak's findings on various aspects of the diamond industry for Surat. The findings were discussed by Professor Chanshyam Shah, Director, Centre for Social Studies;

and Professors M.N. Raval and O.S. Gupta (South Gujarat University). About 75 owners of the diamond factories also participated in the deliberations of the seminar. Professor Pathak will be preparing a monograph updating his findings on the diamond industry in Surat to be brought out by CRMS.

Research

CRMS has sponsored a research project on "Disaster Management in Saurashtra Region of Gujarat" by Professors Nirmala Murthy, V.K. Gupta, and D.K.Desai. Briefly, the objectives of the study are to prepare case studies to understand the management problems pertaining to a natural disaster and to draw on the experience gained from the actions taken by various units of the social system during the 1983 disaster in the Saurashtra region of Gujarat.

During the year data from 10 villages of Junagadh and Amreli districts affected by the disaster were collected. Secondary data on damage and relief work have also been collected. The data are being analysed and the report is expected to be completed by September 1985.

Other Activities

CRMS has financed the Gujarati translation of Professor S.P. Seetharaman's two reports:
"Managing Cotton Business of Small Farmers'
Integrated Co-operatives" and "Management of Integrated Cotton Co-operative System to Reach Small Farmers." These translations will be used in a two-week training programme for the managers of cotton ginning and pressing cooperatives to be held in 1985.

During the year CRMS also published a report entitled Centre for Regional Management Studies: First Decade in Retrospect, 1973-1983.

XI INFORMATION SYSTEMS AND COMPUTER GROUP

In March 1985 the Institute's faculty approved a proposal to allow Information Systems and computer Group to offer its own courses in the PGP, thus separating it from the Production and Quantitative Methods area. The Group functioned with seven faculty members and 14 systems analysts and programmers during last year. Positions were advertised for systems analysts and programmers and five persons were recruited during the year. A faculty position for the Group was also advertised and from amongst the 40 applicants who responded, one offer has been made.

Substantial progress was made towards establishing a Computer-Aided Management (CAM) Centre with the assistance of UNDP and Department of Electronics. The Group's activities covered research, teaching, software development, and provision of computer services to the IIMA community. These are detailed below.

Research Projects

UNDP-CAM Project: In November 1983 the Department of Electronics set up a Computer-Aided Management Center at the Institute. During the year several proposals were

received from faculty members, to do research under the project. These proposals were discussed and approved by the Information Systems Computer Group. A meeting of the Technical Advisory Committee was held on February 25, 1985 to review the progress of the project. The following research projects are proposed to be undertaken under the CAM Project.

- (i) Developing a Decision Support System (DSS)
 Generator for Integrated Area Planning at
 the district level. It is planned to develop
 this into a commercial package in collaboration
 with CMC.
- (ii) Irrigation Systems Layout Optimization.
 Software Package will be developed for optimized layout of canals using experience acquired from the Narmada Project,
 Government of Gujarat.
- (iii) Decision Support System for Portfolio Management. A practical package oriented to the Indian environment will be developed for supporting the decisions of investors in the share market.
- (iv) A graphics-oriented spreadsheet software for developing decision support system.
- (v) A software package for computer aided planning and budgeting of government expenditures using econometric models.
- (vi) In addition project proposals are being discussed in the area of project monitoring and product mix planning.

The Associate Coordinator for the Project went on a study tour to UK and USA with the representatives of the Department of Electronics and representatives of other CAM centres. One member of the core project team has been sponsored to Transport Research Centre, Montreal on a three month fellowship. A grant of Rs. 19 lakh was received to cover the cost of operating budget and creation of site for establishing CAM hardware and library. An order was placed by UNDP for a VAX 11-750 Computer System for IIM Ahmedabad CAM Centre.

District Level Data Base for Development Planning: Interactive graphic software had been designed under this project to provide district planners the capability of analysing village level data of a district for the purposes of infrastructure planning. This software was used in many different contexts during the year and also implemented on HP 1000 based colour graphic system at IIM and the Uniwacs computer system of UP System Development Corporation. The Department of Electronics gave a further grant of Rs. 2.95 lakh under which two micro-computer systems were purchased during the year. These systems have the facility

of input-output in Devnagiri. The interactive graphic software is being transported on the systems to facilitate its use in the Hindi-belt states.

Computer-Aided Planning of distribution System Layouts

for Narmada Project: Software was developed to design

and evaluate the distribution canal layouts for a

block within Narmada Project. Interactive computer

graphics was used as decision support aid in optimising

the canal system costs. The software was developed on

HP 1000 colour graphic system.

Teaching Programmes

The Computer Group mounted three MDPs during the year including the three months CBIS course. All these programmes were well attended. The Group offered four elective courses in the PGP. Hands-on experience in using micro-computer systems was provided in the computer module offered in the Top Management Programmes within the Institute.

Publications

Three monographs were published by the faculty. Papers were presented at the TIMS/ORSA Annual Conference in Washington and the CSI Annual Convention in Delhi. Five papers were published by the group's faculty members in various academic journals.

~ Software Development

DSS for Job Shop Scheduling Game: The objective of this system is to provide the players of job shop scheduling game with an electronic gantt chart on a graphic display so that they can develop schedules for the job shop under consideration more easily and more effectively than in the manual form of the game.

- . A package was developed for administration and management of the library under the UNDP-CAM Project, using DBASE-II DBMS. The package offers the facilities for querying on authors, subjects, publishers, books outstanding against subscribers, availability of books in library, and has provisions for handling issues, receipts, and generation of overdue notices.
- A package based on the Codaysyl based network

 Database Systems DBMS-II was implemented to simulate
 activities of a stock exchange. The highlight of the
 package was the implementation of security and integrity
 requirements of the stock-exchange activities, using
 the standard data manipulation features. DBMS-II does
 not have facilities for enforcing integrity and security
 requirements of the type needed for the case.

- Analysis of financial ratios based on balance sheet and profit and loss account data of companies.
- Computer assisted instruction using electronic spread-sheet packages.
- Augmentation of query facilities in DBASE-II to make a relationally complete query language.
- A package implemented in Fortran to teach network data-base concepts. The software provides facilities to browse through individual records in a data base.
- The following software packages which were implemented on PDP-11/70 were transported to the HP 1000 based graphic system.
 - (i) District level planning and decision support system
 - (ii) Simulation of the instructional computer (SMIC)
 - (iii) Location of service facilities in Dharampur taluka.
- Utility software was developed for new micro systems and the HP 1000 based colour graphic system.

COMPUTER CENTER SERVICES

Addition of Hardwares: Three micro-computer systems were added during the year under different research projects. A proposal was made to scrap some of the old equipments and to replace the punching machines by micro-processor based data entry machines.

Computing Resources Usage in Teaching, Research and Consultancy: About 25 faculty members used the computer for teaching in PGP, FPM, FDP, and MDP programmes. The computing system was also used by 35 faculty members for their research and consultancy projects. Total computer usage for this activity was 474 hours in time sharing and 79 block hours.

Usage of Computer by MDP Participants: Participants of several MDPs such as the Advanced Programme on Computer-Based Information Systems, Data Base Management Systems, Decision Support Systems, Project Management Advanced Management Programme, etc., used the computer extensively in their course and project work. Total block hours used were 366.

Computer Usage by Students: PGP, FPM, and FDP participants used 1409 hours of computer time in time sharing and 749 hours in block for their courses, project work, CIS, and dissertation work.

External Users: Educational, commercial organization and government corporation numbering around 10 used the computer facilities on a limited basis.

DATA PROCESSING ACTIVITIES FOR THE INSTITUTE

Computer Centre continued to provide support to the Institute's administrative data processing activities, such as pay roll preparation, Common Admission Test data processing for admission to PGP and FPM programmes, alumni information system, PGP and FPM grading system, financial accounting system (FAS) with the computerized FAS, institute's annual accounts were closed within six weeks of the ending of the financial year. A new system is being developed to create a data base to support Institute's management development programmes activities. Six hundred and sixty six block hours of computer time and 56 time sharing hours were used for the activity.

XII ALUMNI RELATIONS AND ACTIVITIES

IIMA Alumni Population

During the year the IİMA alumni population increased by another 1060 members, the total number now stands at about 14,860. A large number of our alumni are located abroad.

Updating of Alumni Addresses

About 900 change-of-address requests were received from the alumni during the year.

Alumni Election

The election to the Executive Committee of the IIMA
Alumni Association for 1985-87 was held during the year.
The Alumni Office received 26 valid nominations, 14
from West Zone, five from South Zone, five from North Zone and two from East Zone. Elections were conducted for West, South and North Zones. As there were only two nominations for the East Zone, no poll was taken. In all, 3,930 votes were polled and 10 members were elected to the Committee.

IIMA Alumnus

During the year three issues of the IIMA Alumnus were brought out. Efforts are now focused to make it a self-supporting activity.

Souvenir Items

Souvenir items were made available for sale to the alumni. Items worth of over Rs. 12,000 were sold during the year.

Alumni Directory

Hyderabad Directory of the alumni was brought out and mailed to the alumni in Hyderabad.

Chapter Activities

During the year Ahmedabad, Baroda, Bombay, and Madras chapters were quite active.

On September 22, 1984 Ahmedabad chapter organized a dinner meeting on the IIMA Campus to felicitate Professor N. R. Sheth on his being appointed as the Director of the Institute. On December 22, 1984 the chapter organized a performance of Utpal Dutt's Hindi play, Chayanat.

Baroda chapter also organized a special meeting to felicitate Professor N. R. Sheth in September 1984. The chapter members meet on 25th of every month.

Bombay chapter organized number of get-togethers of PGP-I summer trainees during April and May 1984. For the get-together organized on April 27, 1984, the theme was "Careers Today for Young MEAs." A dinner was organized by the Bombay chapter which was attended by a number of alumni and summer trainees, where issues of mutual interest were discussed. The chapter also organized a seminar on Tax Planning in carly January 1985.

Madras chapter organized a quiz programme on January 27, 1985 for students from different management institutes of Madras and nearby areas. It had also organized a meeting to discuss "Industrial Sickr.z.s." The chapter members meet on third Thursday of every month.

XIII FACILITIES

Vikram Sarabhai Library

During the year 2730 new books were added to the Libarary, bringing the total number of books to 104734. The Library has been subscribing to 519 periodicals. Annual reports of leading Indian and foreign companies were acquired during the year.



Campus Development

The work of 12 transit houses for faculty, 8 Type II houses, 10 Type IIA houses, 8 Type I houses, and 20 S-Type houses was completed.


