
# Twenty-Fifth Annual Report

1986 - 87



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The Institute has completed 25 years of its existence. During its silver jubilee year, all of us associated with it can look back at the Institute's steady progress and sustenance of its basic academic character and values in the various dimensions of its programmes and activities with a sense of satisfaction and happiness. Although there is plenty of scope for improvement and growth in the present mix of our activities, we have consistently retained the spirit of critically reviewing our various activities and plans with a view to learning from cumulative experience and adapting to the changing environment and the new demands made on our professional and intellectual resources. During 1985-86, our post graduate programme was reviewed by a faculty committee which suggested significant changes and rationalisation in the content of the programme, sequencing of courses and relative time allocation to various asegments. The recommendations of the committee as adopted by faculty have been implemented with effect from the academic year 1987-88. We have similarly initiated a review of our fellow programme in management with the help of a faculty committee and expect a suitable decision to be made for revitalizing this programme with effect from the next academic year.

In the area of management development programmes, the Institute's progress is reflected in growth in the number of programmes as well as the number of participants in the

various programmes. I should make a special reference to a programme in management information systems offered during the year for senior government officers from the Republic of China. Our Chinese guests participating in this programme stayed on campus for three weeks and provided to us a welcome opportunity of mutual understanding of the two cultures and the current scene of professional management in the two countries. We also conducted an international programmes for women managers as well as a regional workshop on population management for Asia and the Middle East. We hope that these programmes would mark the beginning of an on-going contribution by the Institute to management education and professionalisation of management in Asia and other neighbouring regions. Apart from these international programmes, I would like to mention a programme on top management styles and organisational effectiveness which was attended by a large number of top executives from various sectors of professional management in the country.

Our research and consulting work in industry and some core sectors such as agriculture, cooperatives, energy, health and population have continued during 1986-87. We have been receiving requests for sponsored research and consulting help from an increasing variety of industrial, commercial and government systems and have made our best effort to cope with the growing demand, although we occasionally face difficulties in coping with all such demands in view of heavy pressure on faculty time. During the year under report, we have made good progress in research and extension work in the area of transport management. Our Journal <u>Vikalpa</u> has also seen considerable improvement in the nature and quality of its academic material and its use-fulness for the community of management education and practice. Our computer facilities have been steadily expanding. The concerned faculty and supporting staff have made notable : progress in extending computer application to various programmes and development of software.

We held a variety of academic and cultural functions during the year as a part of our silver jubilee celebrations. A photo exhibition depicting the Institute's history and character has been installed. We held an international conference on management research and a national conference on management education in March 1987. An international work shop on organisational behaviour and social development was held in December 1986. These programmes provided an opportunity to distinguished scholars and practitioners in the respective fields to meet at the Institute and e exchange information and ideas on some vital aspects of professional management and management education. We also had the rare opportunity of having with us Mr. JRD Tata and Professor Derek Bok, President of Harvard University. These dignitaries enlivened our intellectual and social atmosphere during their visit to the Institute. The U.S. and the Chinese ambassadors in India also visited the Institute during 1986-87. In November 1986, the Institute hosted an inter-IIM Meet of students aptly captioned UTSAV-86. The students also held a an innovative marketing fair in which potential sellers and buyers participated in large number and provided to students an opportunity to study sellent issues in marketing. We had an excellent cultural evening in December with the performance of a beautiful dance-drama by the Darpans Academy. We have decided to extend our silver jubilee celebrations up to the end of the academic year 1987-88.

I am happy to inform you that an association called "Friends of IIM Ahmedabad" has been incorporated in the USA. This association will work for strengthening the links between the Institute and its alumni and friends abroad. As a first step, a directory of IIMA friends in America has been prepared. Some of our alumni chapters, notably Bombay, have made commendable plans to expand their academic and social activities and celebrate the silver jubilee through innovative programmes.

The Institute's well-being and progress are essentially a product of the effort and dedication of faculty, staff and students. The help and support we have continuously received from the Board of Governors, IIMA Society, government, industry our alumni and the community are also meet valuable for accomplishment of the Institute's mission and objectives. I would like to express our appreciation and gratitude to all of them.

# 8. Endowed Chairs

#### 3. POST-GRADUATE PROGRAMME IN MANAGEMENT

The Twenty-third session of the Post-Graduate Programme in Management (1986-88 batch) began on July 1, 1986 with an enrolment of 206 students, which included one student who had been asked to repeat the first year of the programme. Eight first year students discontinued their studies during the year for various reasons. Three students had to discontinue their studies during the third term on account of illness.

The first year class strength at the end of the year was 195 which included 22 students belonging to SC/ST. Out of the 195 first year students will specialize in agricultural management during the second year of their studies. The second year programme (1985-87 batch) commenced on June 25, 1986 with an enrolment of 173 students. One of them has proceeded abroad for higher studies. Out of the three students who were granted conditional promotion to the second year, two have fulfilled the requirements and the third student has been asked to repeat the first year programme during the academic year, 1987-88.

At the end of the secondyear 172 students had satisfactorily completed the academic requirements for graduation from the Institute. This included 27 specializing in agricultural management and 14 belonging to SC/ST. academic year, IIMA had hosted the visit. The Inter-IIM Meet was held on the campus during the period November 10 to 13, 1986. Our students had actively participated in various events such as sports, debates, management games, and other social, cultural, and academic activities. A total of about 200 and a students represented other Institutes.

## Admission of Foregin Students

Under the student exchange programme, three students from the ESSEC Graduate School of Management, France visited the Institute. One student took regular courses in the first and second term and two students attended courses in the second term of the second year of the programme.

#### Graduation of 1985-87 Batch

One hundred and sixty-nine students including 27 students with specialization in agricultural management were awarded the Institute's Post-Graduate Diploma in Management at the 22nd Annual Convocation held on March 30, 1987. Dr Raja Remanna delivered the Convocation address. The following three students received the "Indian Institute of Management, Ahmedabad Medals for Scholastic Performance":

#### Preparatory Programme

Thirty six students who were identified to be deficient in basic mathematics and/or communication on the basis of their academic background, performance in the admission test and interviews were called to attent the Preparatory Programme which was held from June 2 to 21, 1986. Twenty-eight students attended the Preparatory Programme and found it quite useful.

#### Curriculum

During the year the first year students had to study 22 compulsory courses, 7 each in the first two terms and 8 in the third term.

In the second year programme (General), 35 elective courses were offered in addition to a two-unit compulsory course in Business Policy. Moreover, 46 one-term project courses were offered to 84 students in the areas of their interest.

In the second year programme (specialization in Agricultural Management) nine compulsory courses, inclusive of a project course and 9 elective courses were offered. Six students had pursued a Course of Independent Study (CIS) equivalent to two units of courses.

#### Students' Exchange Visit

During the last few years, the students of IIM, Ahmedabad, Calcutta, Bamgalore, and Lucknow have been paying goodwill visits to the other Institutes in rotation. During the current

On the basis of the review, the course mix under-Similarly, the course contents and sequencing went changes. also were reviewed thoroughly and a revised package of courses was introduced, taking into consideration the overall objectives of the programme. The revised package of courses was implemented beginning the academic year 1987-88. Highlights of the new package include a reduction in contact sessions from 542 to 481, redesigning of the orientation programme, shifting of HRM and Computer courses to first term, shifting to LAB to second year, dropping of ISPE and integrating its inputs into all courses, integrating mechanisms, presummer placement workships, post-summer placement presentations, introduction of half credit courses, enhancing the limit on second year electives, synchronization of term breaks, etc.

#### Admission

The Post-Graduate Programme commencing July 1987 attracted 9,208 applications. The comparative figures for this year and the last year are given below:

# IIMA SC/ST Scholarships

During 1986-87 all the 21 students in the first year and 13 students in the second year were awarded this scholarships of R. 1,500 each. Of these students, five from first year and two from second year were given waiver of tuition fee and room rent of R. 1,430 each.

#### PLACEMENT

#### Permanent Placement

This year 188 organizations announced 877 positions. Eightyeight organizations conducted on campus as well as off-campus interviews and 70 organizations made 236 offers. Out of 173 graduating students 157 required placement assistance and 156 have been placed. Two last year's graduates who had not availed of Institute's placement assistance then were also placed. Out of 236 offers from 70 organizations the students accepted 157 offers and rejected 79 offers. The proportion of job offers accepted for the public sector was 54 per cent, for Indian sector 68 per cent, and for foreign private sector 78 per cent;

#### Summer Placement

Two hundred and one students, including one second year student, were placed for summer assignment. One hundred and twenty-one organizations announced 392 summer assignments and 78 organizations made 234 offers. Out of 201 offers accepted, three students had medical problems and hence 198 students joined public sector organizations, 141 private sector organizations, and 27 foreign private organizations.

#### 4% FELLOW PROGRAMME IN MANAGEMENT

So far 76 students have completed the requirements for Fellow Programme in Management (FPM) and another 44 students are currently at various stages of completing the programme.

#### Admissions

This year 400 candidates applied for admission to the FPM, out of which 81 candidates were called for interview. Admission was offered for 18 students of which 8 have joined the Programme in July 1987.

The French Government has agreed to raise the scholarship money from FF 3000 to FF 4660 per month, ESSEC University has also increased the scholarship money from FF 2200 to FF 2500.

#### Review Committee

A Committee has been formed by the Institute to make a comprehensive review of the total Fellow Programme, its objective, viability, and academic enchancement. The report is expected to be ready before July 1988.

# Placement

Out of the five candidates who have been awarded the title of "Fellow of IIMA" during the 1987 Convocation, four have joined the academic institutions and one has accepted the offer from the industry.

#### 5. FACULTY DEVELOPMENT CENTRE

The FDC offered the Eighth Faculty Development Programme in Management from July 14, 1986 to February 27, 1987. Ten participants from various educational and professional institutions in India participated in the programme. The university teachers who participated in the eigth FDP were from:

Gujarat University, Ahmedabad Osmania University, Hyderabad Aligarh Muslim University, Aligarh South Gujarat University, Surat MS University, Baroda Manipur University, Imphal Institute of Social Science & Research, Vellore

Training Department of Neyveli Lighite Corporation Ltd, Neyveli, and National Council for Cooperative Training, New Delhi also sponsored their faculty for the programme.

A five-day Workshop on Case Development and Case Method was conducted under the aegis of the FDC from June 23 to 27, 1986. The Workshop had 22 teachers from universities, and six from different management institutes in India. Professor S. Vathsala coordinated the Workshop.

The FDC also organized a Conference on Management Education in India. Problems and Prospects from March 9 to 11, 1987 for vice chancellors, deans/heads of management departments and directors of management schools. Professor D.M. Pestonjee coordinated the Conference. In January/February, 1987, the FDC mailed the brochure for the ninth FDP (beginning July 14, 1987) to more than 400 institutions in India and abroad. The response was quite encouraging. The FDP Committee has admitted 16 participants for the (87-88) FDP. Of the 16 participants, 14 are from universities, and two and from the cooperative sector. In addition, an overseas management trainee from Matsushita Electric Indl. Co, Osaka, Japan has been accorded observer status.

# 6. RESEARCH AND PUBLICATIONS

At the end of the academic year 1985-86, five research projects and 18 seed money projects sponsored by the Research and Publications Committee were in progress. During the academic year 1986-87, one research project and 23 seed money projects were initiated. # 7. MANAGEMENT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMMES

Thirty management development programmes were offered the year. Five of them were new. The mix of programmes for general management, sectoral management, and functional management reflected the range and variety of needs in management development.

The number of participants from government, semigovernment, and public sector organizations continue to increase. Participants from the public and the government sector were 588 as against 487 from the private sector. In all 791 organizations sponsored 1075 executives to the Institute's programmes this year.

#### New Programmes

Amongst the five new programmes, two were sponsred by international agencies. The Institute offered a seven-week, Training Programme in Cooperative Project Designing and Implementation, sponsored by the National Cooperative Development Corporation. Twenty-three executives attended the programme from NCDC and other cooperative organizations.

An exclusive Workshop on MIS for Family Planning for officers of China was organized by the Institute. Nine Chinese officers involved in family planning programmes in China attended this workshop. The workshop was sponsored by Population Council.

A new programme on Effective Management of Change was offered for senior executives and line managers who were responsible for performance and productivity of substantial segments of their organizations. Twenty executives from public and private sectors attended the programme.

A one-week programme for IAS Officers on Computer Applications in Government was offered under the sponsorship of Department. of Training and Personnel, Government of India. Thirty IAS Officers attended this programme.

A three-day workshop on Top Managers Styles and Organizational Effectiveness was offered wherein twenty-three top executives from public and private organizations participated. The workshop is offered again.

## General Management Programmes

The 3-Tier programme for Management Development - the oldest and the largest of the Institute's programmes was offered for the twenty-fourth time. In this programme, executives from three different levels -middle, senior and top - participated in exploring and understanding management problems. The top management segment (Tier-III) was offered on the topical theme of "Managing by Strategy". Chief executives of public and private sector undertakings were invited to share their experiences with the programme participants. In all, 200 participants attended the three programmes.

The Institute offered the 17th Management Development Programme for Small and Medium Enterprises which focused on concepts and skills needed for improving productivity and efficiency of small and medium enterprises. Fifty-five participants attended this programme.

The Institute offered the Fifth Advanced Management Programme for public enterprises under the auspices of Bureau of Public Enterprises, Government of India. Thirty senior managers from public sector enterprises attended this programme. Institute will be offering two more Advanced Management Programmes for Public Enterprises during 1987.

# Functional Programmes

Programmes on Computer-Based Information Systems, Human Resources Management, Marketing Decisions: Advances in Data Analysis, Project Management, Advanced Programme in Personnel Management and Industrial Relations, Manufacturing Management and policy, Corporate Planning, Programme for Women Managers: Issues of Role and Authority, Leasing, Human Resources Development, Micro Computers for Managers, Computer-Based Management Decision Support Systems were offered during the year.

# Sectoral Programmes

A management development programme for senior officers

of the Indian Administrative Service (sponsored by Department of Personnel and Training, Government of India) was offered. Twenty-two senior IAS officers attended this programme.

A Regional Workshop for Asia and the Middle East on population programme management - attracted 28 participants from 15 countries. The programme was sponsored by the International Committee on the Management of Population Programmes (ICOMP).

A 15-day programme on Management of Agricultural and Rural Development - attracted 35 participants.

A management development programme for Public Systems Managers was offered under the sponsorship of Department of Personnel and Training, Government of India. Thirtythree officers from various central services attended this programme.

A one-week Training Programme for Senior Officers of State Civil Supplies Corporations was offered by the Institute. Thirty-five senior officers from various State Civil Corporations participated in this programme.

A one-week programme for senior officers of the Mineral and Metals Trading Corporation of India Ltd., was offered for the fourth time. Fourteen executives attended this programme. A two-weektraining programme for senior officers of Silk Handloom Sector was offered. Twenty-seven participants attended this programme.

#### Long Duration Programme

The Institute's eleventh Management Education Programme attracted 43 participants (five participants from Tanzania). This programme is designed to provide an intensive postentry exposure in all areas of management to executives with functional experience who are identified as having the potential to move to general management positions.

#### Programmes Envisaged

The Institute is planning to offer some new programmes/ seminars/workshops, such as Seminar on Administrative Problems of Supervisors, Programme on Materials Management, Seminar on International Leasing, Strategic Analysis and Financial Management for the corporate sector. Programmes sponsored by Department of Personnel for the IAS officers will be expanded substantially. These will include a workshop on Development Administration (for Central Ministers, Secretaries and Additional Secretaries), and Policy Planning in Government (for senior IAS officers), and another workshop on Management in Government (for MPs and Senior IAS officers). The Institute will also offer two Advanced Management Programmes for top executives from the public sector.

## Educational and Training Programmes

<u>Post-Graduate Programme</u>: Twenty-eight students completed the requirements of the Specialization Package in Agriculture (SPA) in the second year of the Post-Graduate Programme.

# Management Development Programmes

Appropriate Management Systems for Agricultural Cooperatives(AMSAC):

This programme was held in collaboration with FAD and the German Foundation for International Development (DSE) from February 16 to April 12, 1986. Twenty-one executives from Kenya, Nepal, Somalia, Sri Lanka, Tanzania, Thailand and Indonesia participated in the programme. They were mostly drawn from the cooperative marketing and supply organizations dealing in agricultural commodities. Senior training officers and teachers from cooperative training institutions also participated.

<u>Management of Agricultural and Rural Development</u>: The programme was conducted from October 15 to 29, 1986. Thirtyfour participants from agriculture, forestry and rural development departments of state governments, banks, and voluntary agencies attended the programme.

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Programme in Cooperative Project Designing and Implementation(CPDI): This programme was organized at the request of the National Cooperative Development Corporation (NCDC), New Delhi, from November 24 to December 20, 1986.

The overall objective of the programme was to help strengthen and upgrade the skills in cooperative project designing and implementation of middle-senior level officers of NCDC and other state/national level cooperative organizations/ institutions collaborating with NCDC. Twenth-three officers were nominated by NCDC for this course.

<u>Programme for Senior Executives of Silk Handloom Sector:</u> This was offered from April 12 to 24, 1987 for senior executives in handloom corporations, apex cooperatives, and government departments dealing with sericulture silk yarn, and silk textiles. The emphasis in the programme was on the analysis of environment and development of decision-making skills using experience based teaching materials.

#### Workshop

<u>production and Marketing of Farm Equipment in India:</u> A total of 66 participants drawn from Agro-Industries Corporation, SSI units, design and development institutions, financial institutions attended the Workshop. The idea of the workshop had arisen due to what we perceived as slow growth in the use of improved farm equipment. The Gujarat Agro-Industries Corporation sponsored the Workshop.

The participants indicated growing demand for equipment in various regions. Two main aspects came to light in the two day deliberations. The first was that although considerable infrastructure has been created to develop new designs, extersion network to transfer the knowhow and create demand, the stands disation and quality certification institutions, credit facilities for purchase and manufacture - the range of equipment in the market is small, quality and reliability poor. It was agreed that there is need to make more effective use of this infrastructure by making the links between various segments active and reciprocal.

The second, was that time has come to rethink some of existing policies, particularly the restriction of equipment manufacture to the SSI units alone. The need for involving larger industry and tractor manufacturers in production and

marketing of equipment was considered worth exploring.

## Advisory Committee

CMA's Advisory Committee was reconstituted in 1986-87 (Annexure II). The Centre's faculty had useful discussion with the members of the Advisory Committee (1984-86) on CMA's research activities.

#### Joint ICAR/IIMA Panel

The Director General of the Indian Council of Agricultural Research, Government of India, constituted for three years from January 1, 1987, a joint panel of experts of ICAR/IIMA to deal with problems of common interest in the areas of agricultural management education and research in the country.

As part of the collaborative work between ICAR and IIMA a national workshop on the "Status of Agricultural Management Education" was held in July 1985 at Coimbatore. Also a three-member committee of Tamil Nadu Agricultural University, Coimbatore, visited the Institute and shared with the faculty colleagues of IIMA their experiences in management science.

# JORK SHOPS

<u>Programme Management</u>: The Workshop on Population Programme Management: The Workshop on Population Programme Management was conducted by the Public Systems Group of the Institute during August 11-23, 1986 in collaboration with the International Committee on the Management of Population Programme (ICGMP). This workshop was meant for persons directly responsible for planning and implementing population, family planning, maternal and child health programme both in government and voluntary agencies.

Government of India

Senior officers of the rank of the dputy director and above, and senior officials from voluntary organizations from Asia and the Middle East countries attended this workshop.

The objectives of the workshop were to acquaint the programme managers with modern management concepts such as strategy formulation, management information system, and human resource development. Also provide platform to share successful programme experience from among the developing countries.

'Twenty-eight participants from various countries such as Bangladesh, China, Egypt, Indonesia, Jordan, Malaysia, Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, and Yeman attended the yorkshop.

# FPM Specialization in Public Systems

There were eight students specializing in Public Systems in the Institute's Fellow Programme in Management during the year 1986-87.

Two members of the core project team have visited the Centre for Transportation Research, University of Montreal, Canada ad and Georgia Tech University, Atlanta, USA during this year.

One faculty member participated in the UNDP-CAM seminar Fourth Generation Languages and Decision Support Systems\* organized by IIM Bangalore when the UNDP expert Dr. Emery visited the CAM centre at IIM Bangalore in January 1987.

The CAM library has acquired around 3000 books covering the recent developments and uses of information technology, decision support systems, and expert systems, etc.

The core faculty members of the CAM project were provided with a PC/XI in their offices under the CAM Project Grant. Two PC/ATs were also procured and -dod to the computing resources of the Institute.

One digitizer (24\* x 24\*) interfaced with Taxtronix 4107 colour graphic workstation was received during the year.

OTHER RESEARCH PROJECTS: On t complation of the project, the canal design software developed by us and the HP 1000 Computer System were transferred to Narmada Planning Group, Gandhinagar. It is understood that the software was used to design and estimate around 1200 Kms. of canal works for the Narmada Project in Gujarat so far.

Exploratory work on expert systems for management was initiated by the faculty members of the group.

### TEACHING AND TRAINING PROGRAMMES

The Group offered three MDPs during the year:

- . Computer Based Information Systems (four weeks)
- . Micro computers for managers (one week)
- . Computer Based Management Decision Support System (three weeks)
- All these programmes were well attended.

Use of Micro computer based softwere systems, has become a regular feature in all other M Ps which have computer modules. The projection equipment inter-faced with PCs was used to improve the effectiveness of sessions based on computers and their applications.

#### **VORKSHOPS**

The Group organized a Workshop on Computers in District Administration in February 1987. The workshop was based on the action research CAM Project at Surendranagar, Gujarat. About 60 participants from different parts of the country attended the workshop.

PGP Courses: The PGP courses were revised in accordance with the suggestions of PGP Review Committee, keeping in view of the training required to effectively use information technology for managerial applications. The following new

courses were designed which would be offered in the first and second years of PGP from 1987-88:

- PGP-I . Introduction to Computers in Management (20 sessions)
  - Management Information Systems (20 sessions)
- PGP-II . Computer Architecture and System Software
  - . Information Systems Design and Implementation
  - . Decision Support Systems

#### PUBLICATIONS

Invited papers were presented by the members of the Group at the Annual Convention of CSI & ORSA. Eight papers were presented by members of the Group in international conferences. Faculty members also published 10 papers in the international journals.

# COMPUTER CENTRE ACTIVITIES

Augmentation of Computing Resources: Ten IBM-PC compatible computing systems with dotmatrix printers, plotter and mouse consisting of IBM-PC/XTs, and PC/ATs were acquired under UNDP and DOE sponsored Computer Aided Management project. Gut of the 10 systems, 6 PC/XTs have been installed in the offices of CAISG faculty working on CAM project. Two PC/ATs and one PC/XT were installed at the main Computer Centre and one PC/XT was installed at the MDC PC Lab. The Centre also provided support services for installation and maintenance of PCs located in the offices of faculty members who acquired PCs for their project work. The centre also procured one PC/AT on computer centre general account.

Acquisition of Projection Equipment: An indigenously manufactured video projection system was procured. PCs could be booked to this system for large screen projections to facilitate viewing by large audiences. This equipment was utilized extensively for all computer based courses, including many MDPs.

Full-fledged Operation of the Vax-11/750 System: The supermini Vax-11/750 which was received in February 1966, under CAM project became fully operational. Since then it has been performing satisfactorily. In addition to CAM project's work the Vax-11/750 was used extensively by PGP and FPM students and participants of computer based management development programmes, especially for software packages like Relational Data Base Management Systems, TDMS Forms Management System, RCL and IGL graphics library and language compilers PASCAL and 'C'.

Use of Personal Computers: The PC Labs at D-14 and KLMDC were extensively used by the institute community. With 20 systems distributed over these two locations growth in PC usage was significant. There was a noticeable shift from using Time Sharing Systems to personal computers for many research and consultancy projects undertaken by the institute faculty. An encouraging aspect of PC applications was the growth in use of wordprocessing by institute's administrative and secretarial staff. A large number of users gained experience in using popular PC based packages such as Electronic Spreadsheets, Data Base Management Systems, and Integrated Software packages like Framework, etc. The PC Labs at both locations were kept open on an average of 15 hours a day, including Saturdays and Sundays. Nearly 40 faculty members, 70 secretarial and administrative staff and participants of 20 Management Development Programmes and all PGP-I and PGP-II students used the personal computers. PC time was also given to a few external users on a limited basis.

<u>Training Courses Organized</u>: The Computer Centre organized short duration training programmes for staff of the MDP office and Publications Unit on the use of personal computers and PC based packages such as wordprocessing and spreadsheets. Hands-on experience was given to all participants of such programmes. The Publications Unit of the Institute has put many case materials on the floppy media. Many documents were also prepared using wordprocessors and letter quality printers.

Drientation programmes for Computer Centre Staff and C&ISG faculty on Vax-11/750 system and associated software were offered by M/s Hinditron Computers, Bombay. Training covering a total of six weeks was offered on the following topics:

- VAX/VMS and Utilitise
- Detatrieve interactive query and data management package (DTR/VMS)
- . Relational Data Base Management System (RDB/VMS)
- . IGL and RGL graphics packages

# Use of Computers in Teaching, Research and Consultancy

Projects : Nearly 20 members of the faculty used PDP-11/70 system for teaching in PGP, FPM and MDP programmes. Vax-11/750 system was used by about 15 faculty members for teaching, research and consultancy projects. PDP-11/70 was used by about 20 members of faculty for research and consultancy project. Total computer time used for this activity was about 500 hours in time-sharing and 50 hours in booking on POP-11/70 and 300 hours in Vax-11. About 1200 hours of PC time was used for consultancy and research projects. Computers' Use in MDPs, PGP and FPM Courses : Almost all management development programmes used personal computers in their course and project work. Total block hours of PC time used by MDP participants was nearly 3000 hours. In addition MDPs used a total time of nearly 1000 terminal hours on both Vax-11/750 and PDP-11/70 taken together. PGP students and FPM students used 800 hours on PDP-11/70 and Vax-11/750 system.

# Data Processing Activities for the Institute

Computer Centre continued to provide support in data processing activities of IIMA's administrative systems. Some of the highlights of the year under report are as follows:

- Design and development of a new pay-roll system to implement Fourth Pay Commission's recommendations
- Development of programs for pay fixation as per Fourth Pay Commission Report
- . Computation of slary arrears
- Processing CAT-1987 data for all the IIMs over and above IIMA's PGP admission's data processing

- Development and implementation of an accounting system for IIMA staff credit and cooperative society
- . Development of professional tax system

In addition, PGP and FPM office, Alumni Office, and Accounts Section used PDP-11/70 and PCs for grading, alumni mailing list and financial accounting system respectively. All the programmes that were earlier in V.3.0 IAS operating system were converted to V.3.1 thereby saving substantial block booking of computer time used earlier for Ddata processing activities of the Institute. About 1600 hours of terminal time were used for IIMA's administrative data processing system during 1986-37.

#### Assistance Provided by Computer Centre Staff

The staff at the Computer Centre Worked on development of programmes required for various consultancy and research projects undertaken by Institute's faculties such as CAM, Optimal Layout of Canal System in Narmada Command Area, MIS for Handlooms, and also in all computer based postgraduate programme courses such as COPS, MIS, UPPI, DSMS, SAS, and CADM. Computer Centre staff provided extensive assistance for computer-lab sessions, design of computer based exercises and development of course material. A total of nearly 1200 man hours of assistance was provide: to all MDP courses for computer lab-sessions.

# Guidance Provided to Students of other Academic Institutions for Project Work

Students of several academic institutions and other organizations such as L.D. College of Engeering, Gujarat University, Amola Computer Centre, Government Polytechnic, etc. carried out their projects in computer related fields. Assistance was provided to these students in identification of projects, and implementing the project related programs.

# Implementation of Existing Software and Development of New Software

During the year the computer centre staff were involved in the following projects and assignments.

Testing of NROF package in ULTRIX operating system for preparation of documents.

Extensive testing of HCL's Beenet LAN S/W to identify problems in LAN operations.

An utility package on Vax-11 to copy VMS created ASCII files on disk to unlabelled ASCII on magnetic tape.

A library of graphics routines in 'C' with assembly language interface.

A package for accounting Vax-11/750 system usage by various category of users.

A package for splitting of Alumni master records after they are transferred to POP-11/70 through Kermit on Vax-11/750.

# 12. ALUMNI RELATIONS AND ACTIVITIES

# IIMA Alumni Population

During the year the IIMA alumni population increased by 1061 members and the total now stands at 16,838. A large number of our alumni are located in foreign countries.

# Updating Alumni Address

About 100 change-of-address requests were received fro from the alumni during the year. These changes were carried out by the Alumni Office.

#### Alumni Election

The election to the Executive Committee of the IIMA Alumni Association for 1987-89 was held during the year. The Alumni Office received 14 valid nominations, nine from West Zone, three from South Zone, and two from North Zone. No nominations were received from East Zone. Eight members were elected to the committee.

#### IIMA Alumnus

During the year all the three issues of the <u>IIMA Alumnus</u> were brought out. Efforts were also made through advertisements etc. to defray the printing cost of the magazine.

#### Souvenir Items

Souvenir items such as ities, key chains, ash trays, cuff-links were sold to the alumni.

#### Chapter Activities

The Alumni and friends of IIMA formed an association known as Friends of IIMA (FIIMA) which was registered in the district of Columbia, USA as a non-profit corporation March 17, 1987. FIIMA will be governed by a Board of directors headed by a Chairperson. The other officers of FIIMA will be President, Secretary, and Treasurer. Mr. Peter Geitner, who headed the Ford Foundation activities in India in the early years of the Institute and who is now at the Foundation headquarters at New York, has accepted to serve as Chairperson for the first year. Dr. Samuel Paul, the former Director of IIMA and now with the World Bank, has agreed to be the President.

During the year the Delhi, Bangalore, and Pune Chapters were reactivated. Efforts were being made to launch an alumni chapter in New York and to bring out a directory of alumni located in USA and Canada.

Ahmedabad Chapter organized a panel discussion on "Computer in Industry" focussing on how to go about deciding on the right kind of computer for any organization. It also screened "In Search of Excellence" for the benefit of its members.

The Madras Chapter arranged a talk on "Budget and the Emergent Trends in Stock Market" by Mr. Ramaswamy, President of the Madras Stock Exchange on April 3, 1986 at Hotel Chola Sheraton. A social get-together with a file show was held on May Day, 1986.

Hyderabad Chapter had organized a get-together of its members with their families in Hotel Emerald on June 14, 1986.

Mr. Venkataramanaiah, Marketing Manager, Andhra Pradesh Electronics Development Corporation was the chief guest and delivered a talk on "Electronics Industry in India."

Pune Chapter organized a symposium on "Career Opportunities in Management" in collaboration with the Symbiosis Institute of Business Management (affiliated to Pune University). The symposium was attended by over 70 students from various MBA programmes in Pune.

Delhi Chapter organized a contributory get-to-knoweach-other dinner on March 14, 1987 at the India International Centre. Nearly 150 alumni along with their spouses attended it.

#### 13. FACILITIES

## Vikram Sarabhai Library

During the year 3600 books were added to the library bringing the total number of books to 1,11,876. The library subscribes to about 600 periodicals. Annual reports of leading Indian and foreign companies were acquired during the year.

In addition to performing its normal services, the library provides reference, indexing, and bibliographical services on management literature.

The Institute's library follows an open-stack system. Twentytwo closed carrels and 44 open carrels are provided for individual study. The main reading hall accommodates 100 readers. There are also facilities for group studies.

Vikram Sarabhai Library is also bringing out every month "List of Selected New Books on Management and Related Disciplines".

#### Campus Development

Construction of 12 houses for the faculty and staff is almost nearing completion. Work on another 23 additional houses for the faculty and staff will also commence soon. This will complete the total housing programme for the faculty and staff as per the master plan of the present 65 acre Campus. Approach road to KLMDC starting from Main Gate and meeting existing square near D-16/Cl. Room 324 (Community Hall) is already completed.

Tenders for academic extention to KLMDC consisting of theatre type class-room, flat class room, seminar rooms, administrative offices, etc. are being invited soon by the Architects.

Work on the remaining campus boundary also will be taken us soon.
